A Striking Difference.

Mankind are constituted to confide in ach other, and that trust is often reposed in men who deserve it by nothing order. except effrontery, knavishness or ignorance. Men' are more or less imposed upon by others, and often a second time by the same person. But what can be thought of a man or set of men who repeatedly rest their dearest interests in the management of others, who commit a breach if not a betrayal of the confidence? And what impudence can be sublimer than that of a man who always bungles or betrays, to again demand the confidence which he always violates?

Designing and corrupt men have received the support of both political parties in this country. The method of each party, is remarkable. When a Democrat has violateed in the office which has been confided to him, the duties and decencies pertaining to it, he receives but little if any reprobation in his party. Look at the Tammany thieves who robbed the city of New York, and it will be observed that it took a political revolution to break their leach like adhesion to power and plunder. The history of official corruption in our own State since the war shows that all the Democrats who were in the ring to profit by the issue of railroad bonds are as high in the office and affections of their party as before, and some of them higher, while the men who for the sake of loot called themselves Republicans, and were engaged in the same baseness, are ejected from the party to which they were temporarily atached.

In the debate last Saturday in the lower House of Congress, Mr. Kelly brought Ben Franklin forward in support of expansion. Now the schoolboys who are even less informed than the one Macaulay so often refers to, know that Ben Franklin liked specie payments., His financial policy consisted in maxims which taught the art of getting money-hard money-and hoarding it. Honest old Ben would be aghast could be look at this country at the present time. Every thing is so diflerent from his rather obstinate opinions that the old gentleman would be glad to get back to his resting place .-His notions were eminently adapted to the condition of the country as it was in his time, on rather to the acquisition of property by individuals.

Who is Caught? The sapient and mellow-voiced Senator from Johnston county, Mr. Avera, bent upon doing something smart which would redound to the interest of the Democratic party, and immortalize himself, introduced a resolution in the Senate on Saturday last calling upon Governor Caldwell for an itemized statement of all warrants drawn by the Executive on the State Treasurer in the state Geologist for the years 1868-'69-'70-'71-'72 and '73. It journ, so amended as to adjourn sine was believed by the Senator that a larger amount had been drawn from the Treasury than was authorized by law, and he hoped that at an investigation it would be proved that the excess would be found during Governor Caldwell's administration; and then what a howl he and Joe Turner could raise over it! Well, the dead-fall was set and duly baited; in a little while, down she fell! and the trapper goes to get the game. He finds, to his consternation and amazement, that in 1868, Governor Worth, Democrat, issued warrants for six thousand dollars being one thousand more than he was authorized by law to issue to the Geologist; that in 1869 and 1870 Gov. Holden issued warrant to the same officer to the amount of \$10,950, being \$950 in excess of what the law authorized-and in 1871, '72 and '73, Governor Caldwell issued warrants to the same officer to the same officer to the amount of \$14,950, being \$50 00 less than the amount authorized by law. Mr. Avera proposes to make a big stew out of the game he caught, to which all of his Democratic friends will be inuited, when they will seriously consider the propriety of impeaching Governor Caldwell for "stubbornness" in not allowing Novembraws and from the Treasury. The motion of Mr. Dunham to reconsider the vote by which the amendment of Mr. Cowles to submit the question to the people, after a general discussion, prevailed by a vote of ayes 20, nays 19.

The yote then recurring on Mr.

Cowles' amendment, the year and nays were called, and the amendment was adopted by a vote of ayes 24, nays 14. Mr. Worth offered an amendment

providing that two thirds of the amounts held by bondholders be presented before any part is paid. Adopted. Mr. Morehead, of Guilford, moved to indefinitely postpone.

Mr. Dunham called the previous question, which, being sustained, the vote recurred on the amendment of Mr. Todd, which was offered as a substitute, and providing that the Governor turn dealing with them which obtains in over to the creditors of the State all property, franchises of the State, &c .-The substitute failed.

The vote was then taken on the Worth bill as amended, which passed its second reading by a vote of yeas 26, to

On motion of Mr. Worth, the third reading of the bill was made the special order for Thursday next at 12 o'cleck.

The second special order was taken up at 1 o'clock, being the general election bill, which passed the House several days ago, and reported in full by onr Reporter in that body.

The committee submitted an amendment requiring the Sheriffs to make the returns by registered letters instead of by mail or otherwise," which was adopted.

Mr. Grandy moved to postpone the further consideration till Thursday at 11} o'clock, and the bill be printed with amendments offered by Messrs. Waring and Ellis, of Columbus. Fail-

Mr. Cowles offered an amendment, requiring every veter, when challenged, to prove by some reliable witness, that he is entitled by the law, &c.. to vote. The yeas and nays were called, and the amendment was adopted by a strict party vote.

In section 16, schedule B, which provides for a license tax of \$35 per annum on tobacco warehouses, Mr. Wheeler moved to strike out "\$35" and in-

The proviso was accepted by the chairman of the Committee on Finance, and became incorporated into
