THE CITIZENS' MEETING.—Last Saturday night, pursuant to a call published in the Patriot, a large meeting of citizens assembled in the Court House, and was organized by the election of J. B. Greeter as chairman, and E. C. Townsend, Secretary. On motion of Thos. B. Keogh, a committee of five from each ward was appointed by the chair, to nominate candidates for Mayor and Commissioners, to be reported for the ratification or rejection of the meeting. The committee reported the name of Cyrus P. Mendenhall for Mayor; and recommended that an open ballot be taken for Commissioners. On motion, Mr. Mendenhall was unanimously nominated by the meeting. The following votes were cast for Commissioners:
North Ward—W. S. Rankin, 19; Jno. Weatherly, 18; John W. Payne, 28; S. Steele, 26; James W. Albright, 28; W. B. Farrar, 5; J. W. S. Parker, 18.
South Ward—John T. Rees, 46; D. W. C. Benbow, 31; A. P. Eckel, 14; W. D. McAdoo, 13; B. E. Sergeant, 15; J. A. Odell, 2; A. Brockman, 7; Thos. McDonald, 12; J. I. Scales, 6; W. H. Hill, 3; M. T. Hughes, 5.
Payne, Steele, Albright, Rees and Benbow were declared nominated.—There being another election to be made, on motion, the four highest not chosen, were voted for, namely, Eckel, McAdoo, Sergeant and McDonald. The ballot resulted in the nomination of W. D. McAdoo. Thereupon the chair announced the ticket as follows:

FOR COMMISSIONERS:
North Ward—John W. Payne, Seymour Steele, Jas. W. Albright.
South Ward—John T. Rees, D. W. C. Benbow, W. D. McAdoo.

The following platform was unanimously adopted:
"Resolved, That the Citizens' Meeting present the following as their platform: Public Schools, Improved streets; Means for Extinguishing Fires, and a City Cemetery."

The meeting was harmonious and in earnest. The ticket presented is a good one. If elected, the result can not be claimed as a Republican or Democratic victory, but a triumph of the people.

GOOD TEMPLARS.—The Lodge in this place is increasing so rapidly, that it has been necessary to get more seats, to accommodate the constantly augmenting membership. This does not look as if the order was dying out in Greensboro. During the quarter about to expire, there have been forty-nine initiations and four accessions by card from other lodges; seven withdrawals and one death; leaving a net increase of forty-five members; and several propositions for membership are now pending, to be acted on at the next meeting, the last of the quarter.

SPLendid BUTTER.—We acknowledge the present of some superb golden butter from the dairy of Mrs. A. W. Tourgee. The milk from which the butter was made is from the Jersey stock, brought into the state by Wm. A. Sampson, of the Model Farm, High Point. These cows are small and inferior looking, but are remarkable for the quality, if not the quantity of their milk. We understand Mr. Sampson gets fifty-five cents per pound for all the butter he makes, and judging from that made by Mrs. Tourgee, it is well worth that price, when compared with the grease called butter, usually brought to our market. We are told by those who know, that better butter can be made in North Carolina, all through the year, than in the north.—Good butter is a luxury, and with good bread, is excellent enough for any one's palate; but good butter cannot be made without knowing how.—Mrs. Tourgee knows how.

DEATH OF MRS. HARR.—Mrs. Harr, wife of Prof. Harr, of Greensboro Female College, died quite suddenly on Monday. The circumstances attending her death are very affecting. She leaves several small children and a husband who are in deepest gloom at their irreparable and unexpected loss. INFANTICIDE.—On last Wednesday there was a colored infant found secreted in or near a graveyard in the northern portion of the City. THE UNISSUED \$4,000,000.—Statement of the Controller.
WASHINGTON, April 23.—The Controller of the currency has to-day replied to a resolution of the committee on Banking and Currency, inquiring what amount of the \$4,000,000 of bank note circulation remains unissued. He says the amount remaining unissued on the 1st day of November was stated in his last report to be \$5,649,051, and a statement is furnished the committee exhibiting the allotment of this currency at this time, giving the names of the different persons and institutions to whom the amount was assigned. Since that time about one-fourth of the amount has been issued to banks which had perfected their organizations, leaving at this date about \$4,000,000 unissued. During the month of March letters were addressed to all institutions and persons whose applications were on file, informing them that unless the amount to which they were entitled was secured by the deposit of United States bonds within thirty days the balance unsecured and uncalled for would be apportioned to other applicants, and in accordance with the terms of this letter, more than one-half of the whole amount has been thus reassigned as exhibited in a statement furnished the committee. In the distribution of this currency the Controller has followed as strictly as possible the act of July 12, 1870, which provides that the circulation shall be distributed to banking associations organized or to be organized in States having less than their proportion, giving the preference to such as have the greatest deficiency. When applications have been made for the remaining circulation, and the parties have failed to perfect their organization, the Controller has endeavored to redistribute the circulation in the Congressional Districts of the States to which it has been previously assigned, and if the whole amount has not been promptly issued, it is because Representatives in Congress have requested, in many instances, further delay in the organization of banks in their own districts.

Bald Mountain.
The Asheville Examiner of the 23d inst., is furnished by a gentleman of veracity with the following in regard to the renewed disturbances at Bald Mountain, which we reproduce as it cannot fail of being of interest to the reader:
"On last Friday at fifteen minutes past 7 o'clock, p. m., the people of Old Fort and many other places in the vicinity of Bald Mountain, were greatly startled at the terrible shaking of the mountain. Everybody in the village of Old Fort was roused to the highest pitch of excitement for the time. The effect was described by the following gentlemen of unquestioned veracity:
"Col. J. C. Whitson, the Depot Agent at Old Fort, was sitting in a chair within the depot at the time. He heard a terrible, heavy, rumbling noise, says the house shook very perceptibly, that the chair in which he sat shook very considerably and that the glass in the windows of the depot building rattled continuously for some seconds.—S. Worthen heard a terrible noise at the same time, was in his house and felt the house quiver in every part—the sound was like a heavy body of snow sliding off the house—ran out of the house and called the attention of others to the same.
"J. C. Hight, a merchant in Old Fort, was sitting on the counter at the time—felt the counter move and home shake—the string of tin-ware hanging above the counter vibrated like a pendulum for several seconds—several spokes at same time, all very much startled. One man said "What is that?" Another said, "is not that an earthquake?" The sound was like a heavy blast, then appeared to die away making a noise like a heavy wagon running over plank.
