During the month of March letters were addressed to all institutions and persons whose applications were on file, informing 1874. them that unless the amount to which they were entitled was secured within thirty days the balance unsecured and uncalled for would be apportioned to other applicants, and in accordance with the terms of this letter, more than one-half of the whole amount has been thus reassigned as exhibited in a statement furnished the committee.
