THE NEW YORK CITY TROUBLES.—Experts are hard at work on the books and papers of the Comptroller's office. Mr. Warren, who stands at the head of the corps, thinks he will complete his work within two weeks.

General James H. Clanton, one of the best lawyers, and most popular men of Alabama was shot and instantly killed last evening by Col. D. M. Nelson, of Cleveland, Tenn.

The details of this affair, as given by the Press, too long for this issue of our paper, show that there was no excuse of quarrel between the parties, who had no acquaintance with each other until five or ten minutes before.

A paper just started in New York, in the interest of the Southern States, tells the following undeniable truths concerning the Southern people:

A NATURAL ORATOR.—They have an oratorical prodigy in Raleigh, in the person of DICKER TILLEY, a boy less than 12 years old. He occupied the Hall of the House of Representatives last Saturday evening, where he held, spell-bound, a large audience of the citizens of the place.

RESIGNED.—Mr. A. H. Hiley, superintendent of public instruction, has resigned the office and gone home North. Alexander McIver, Esq., of Mecklenburg county, has been appointed to fill the vacancy.

We visited the Fair Grounds yesterday evening to get the look of things, and was much surprised and gratified to meet there a large number of citizens, ladies and gentlemen, old and young, who seem to have been prompted, in the main, by curiosity, as we were, to see what was going on.

BOUNDED OVER TO NOVEMBER.—Mr. R. E. Wilson, Lucio Mitchell and William Beard, who got into a personal difficulty with Solicitor STARBUCK, Sunday morning after the late Term of the U. S. Circuit Court at this place, were ordered to Raleigh for trial there.

WATER.—The people of Charlotte will vote at an election to be held there November 1st, on the question of appropriating \$50,000 (to be raised by the issuance of bonds, to run thirty years), for the purpose of providing an abundance of water for the city.

BUTLER DEFEATED.—The Radical State Convention of Massachusetts has defeated Ben. Butler, who was a zealous—determined candidate for the nomination for Governor. They have kicked him out, woman suffrage, labor reforms, spoons and all, and chosen the Hon. Wm. B. Washburn, by a large majority.

Now as formerly, I think it wise to use calm and moderate methods in dealing with questions of state, to adhere scrupulously to constitutional forms in enforcing the will of the people, and to make haste slowly with revolutionary reforms.

Chief Justice Chase has declared, in an interview with a correspondent of the Cincinnati Enquirer, that he fully approves of the platform of the democracy of Wisconsin, and hopes that Senator Doolittle, who has been nominated for Governor, may be elected.

The Cotton Crop.—Some of our exchanges assert that the cotton crop will be short one-fourth. If this be true, Cotton will sell at correspondingly high figures, and the people (the consumers) of cotton goods, may expect to pay more for their shirts, calicoes, &c.

A riot occurred in Danville, Va., on the evening of the 30th Sept., from an attempt on the part of a mob of negroes to rescue a negro from arrest.

A bill of injunction has been filed in the U. S. Circuit Court at Richmond, Va., against the Virginia and Tenn. R. R. Co., charging the consolidation of that Road with others to be illegal and unconstitutional.

On Thursday, in the U. S. Circuit Court, as we learn from the Sentinel, the jury returned the following verdicts in the cases of the defendants named: Not guilty, Benjamin Gould, Joseph Wilson, Daniel Gould, Alfred Early, Joseph Depriest, James McDaniel, Joseph McDaniel, Achilles Darham and John Calton.

The charges contained in the three counts of the indictment are as follows: The 1st charged the defendants with conspiring to beat Aaron V. Biggerstaff to prevent him from exercising his right of suffrage.
