THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

The Board Discusses Road Improvement and Other Matters.

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday.

The Woodleaf school tax matter came up for discussion. One of the first townships to vote this tax was Unity. A number of voters fought the measure and now there is a numerously signed petition before the board, for an election to repeal it.

The road question engaged the attention of the board to a greater extent than usual. The road force is now at work in different sections of the county. It is proposed to macadamize the Coolemees road to Second creek, (this to be done by the Coolemees people) and for this county to meet them at this point and extend the road to the Wilkesboro road.

It was decided to send one of the road forces to the Statesville road on the other side of Cleveland and will work that road from the B. A. Knox place to third creek bridge.

The contract for furnishing supplies to camp No. 1, was awarded to R. M. Roseboro, of Cleveland Klutz & Randleman will furnish supplies to camp No. 2.

Citizens of Spencer and East Spencer petitioned for a railroad crossing near the Southern freight sheds. Consideration of this matter was deferred until the next meeting.

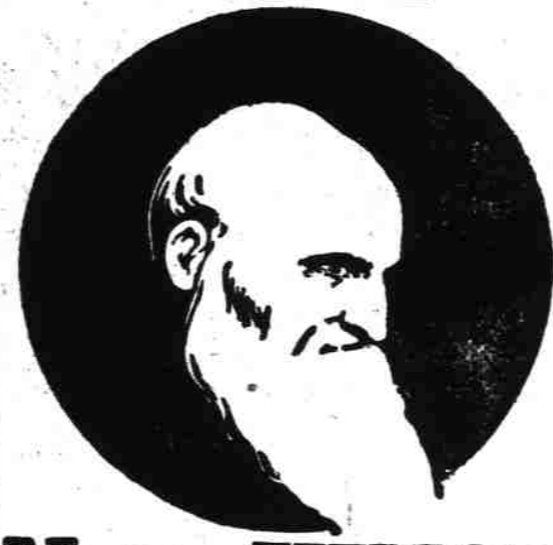
