THE ELECTION YESTERDAY.

Convention Meets and Declares Result Which is Given Below.

The primary election yesterday passed off quietly and resulted in the selection of the present incumbent as the Democratic nominee for mayor of Salisbury, at the election in May. The vote of each ward is given in detail. This vote shows a few more ballots were cast for the candidates for mayor than for those for aldermen. 907 votes were cast for mayor and 1776 for aldermen, and the latter number being out in two, as each elector voted for two aldermen, makes this vote 79 less than that cast for mayor. Following is the vote by wards:

North Ward.—For mayor, Vanderford 195, Boyden 80, Heilig 2. Aldermen, Hennesse 150, Daniel 129, Crawford 102.

South Ward.—For mayor, Boyden 208, Vanderford 89. Aldermen, Wallace 177, Welch 147, Beard 195, McCannless 99.

East Ward.—For mayor, Boyden 177, Vanderford 110, Heilig 1. Aldermen, Kesler 267, Parker 204, Bradshaw 94.

West Ward.—For mayor, Boyden 112, Vanderford 58. Aldermen, Strachan 142, Maupin 140. Boyden's majority 180.

At 8 o'clock last night a convention was held at the court house. After effecting a permanent organization the returns of the election were canvassed and the result declared in accordance with the result given above.


