Southern Man for President.

There is renewed talk of a Southern man for the Democratic presidential nomination, and Senator Daniel, of Virginia, is now under discussion. The present prospect is that Mr. Bryan will be the nominee and we confess that we have no hope of the success of the Southern man idea, as much as we desire it. We believe it would be better in the end, certainly for the South, which is now about all of the National Democratic party, and that the party would have a better chance of success ultimately, if a Southern man was nominated. But the leaders of the party are in the main wedded to Mr. Bryan and those who oppose him will not try to overcome the sentiment in his favor. His friends argue that he can get more votes than a Southern Democrat. Maybe so, but he has never been able to get enough to get elected and at the present time we can see no possible hope of his success. The country seems to be afraid to trust Mr. Bryan. It is useless of course to nominate a man of the type of Judge Parker. That experiment in 1904 showed that the extreme Bryan following will not support him, just as the extremists on the other side will not support Mr. Bryan. If the national Democratic party is ever to succeed it would seem that it is time for it to get away from these two extremes. But, as said at the outset, we have no hope of seeing the programme changed next year. We simply mention these things as of passing interest.—Statesville Landmark.
