My dear Miss White: We expect to have a Music Festival here on the 19th and 20th of May (during the 20th of May festivities) and I write you to see if it would be possible for you to organize the singers of your city and rehearse them once (or twice) a week on the "Stabat Mater" by Rossini, which we expect to give the night of the 19th. Our idea is to get the cities near Charlotte to co-operate with us and make the festival an annual event. We expect to have a local chorus of about 100 voices, which we want to augment to 200 if possible, by calling on the nearby places to furnish singers. Each singer will receive one or more complimentary tickets to the festival. May I ask that you see some of your musical people and if possible start the rehearsals at once. We will furnish you the music free of charge. Kindly let me hear from you at once.

Another Ticket.

All is not serene in the town of Spencer, and there will be something doing there at the election to-day, as there has been for the past few days. It will be remembered that at a mass meeting of the citizens of Spencer it was agreed that a non-partisan municipal ticket should be nominated—that the best men should be put up, and that, practically speaking, the lion and the lamb would herd together on the same ticket, provided they happened to get on it. Postmaster Jas. D. Dorsett was nominated for mayor. Whether there has been some soreness over this fact, or whether some of the defeated candidates in the first primary felt they did not get justice, we cannot say, but a new ticket is in the field. An appeal has been made to the voters to give the following ticket their support:

Mayor, W. L. Ray; aldermen, D. E. Greenhill, B. O. Blaylock, W. H. Burton, J. E. Eagle, O. C. Godfrey and J. H. Benton.

The reason for this second ticket is set forth in the following statement, addressed to the "qualified voters of Spencer":

"The recent primary failed to express the choice of a majority of the citizens of Spencer for mayor and alderman on account of over 50 men voting in said primary who have never paid any tax in Spencer and are not listed for tax. The registration books show only 812 men registered. The poll books for the primary show 889 men voted in the primary. A number of the citizens are not pleased with this condition and believe Spencer affairs should be controlled by Spencer citizens, and are offering the following named gentlemen as candidates for mayor and aldermen."
