K. and sailed for Europe Sunday. The boys were: Frank Yancey, Alex Buford, Alfred Buerbaum, Ray Thompson, James Jahn, Harold Watson and Lamar Ramsey.

The Women's Missionary Society of the First Presbyterian Church on last Thursday afternoon gave a reception in honor of Mrs. Robt. Coit, who leaves shortly with her husband, Rev. Robt. Coit, for Korea where the latter will resume his duties as a missionary in a foreign field, after a years stay in this country. The reception proved to be one of the most delightful events of the season, and was greatly enjoyed by all who attended.

F. H. Cushing, a native of Salisbury, who for a good many years was an engineer and was also engaged in the insurance business, will take up the latter again and will be located in Asheville. He has a host of friends who will learn with interest that he will engage in that business again.

The Classis of the Reformed Church of North Carolina will meet in Salisbury on Thursday April 6th. The purpose of this meeting is of taking definite action in reference to Claremont College. It is said that a plan is to be submitted at this meeting to bring the girls department from Catawba College at Newton to Salisbury.

Albemarle is to have another cotton mill, the same to cost \$100,000 and will be known as the Wisconsin Mill No. 5. Messrs. Holbrook and Bradshaw of Salisbury have been awarded the contract to erect same and work will begin at once. The building will be three stories high.

The Women's Missionary Societies of Salisbury district will convene in Forest Hill Methodist Church, of Concord on next Friday night, at 7:30 o'clock. Mrs. O. M. Bobbitt of Spencer is the district secretary will preside.

The Southern Shops at Spencer which have been working short time for two months will close during the month of April. This affects all departments except the car repairing department which will work five days.

It was stated some time ago that Spencer has signed a lighting contract with the Public Service Company for 10 years. This however was a slight mistake as the contract has not yet been signed, but as the proposition looks good it has been submitted by the company, but the officials have neither signed the contract nor voted to sign it.

Chief of Police Miller, who is to be chief marshal for the parade of school children at the county commencement on Thursday states that he will use every effort to keep the streets clear of vehicles during the parade. It is necessary for the protection of the children to do this so automobiles will please use the eastern half of Main Street for these five blocks from 10:30 until the parade has passed.

Shannon Murphy who has been ill with pneumonia at Lewisburg, West Virginia, is now on the road to recovery. Mrs. N. P. Murphy, his mother, who has been with him for several weeks says that he has passed the crisis, and that he will begin to recover rapidly.

Bishop Price, colored, of Charlotte came to Salisbury Monday night to claim the body his sister, Lucinda Price who was shot and killed Sunday night by Jim Cooper. He wanted to take the remains to Charlotte but was not financially able to do so.

Superintendent Kizer of the public schools, reports that there will be 192 graduates this year from the various public schools of Rowan County. He says this is a record number.

Sheriff Krider, went to Charlotte Tuesday on No. 7 after Jim Cooper who shot and killed Lucinda Price on Sunday night. Cooper will be brought to Salisbury and placed in jail to await the next term of Rowan Superior Court at which time he will be placed on trial for his life. Sheriff Krider heard that Cooper was from Charlotte and suspected that he would make for that place for a short time at least. He advised Charlotte officers to keep an eye open for him which they did and ended in the arrest of the murderer.

The Alderman of the city held an important session last Thursday night in the City Hall and took up the question of taking a police census of Salisbury. The census will record the name of each individual, adult, youth or infant, the street address, color, owner of property occupied and probably contain other valuable information. The compensation for census taken to be one cent for each name.

Alderman Crump stated that many inquires were being made as to what progress was being made with the matter about the light and power rates for Salisbury. T. H. Vanderford stated that all necessary information and papers had been sent to the commission some time ago but that other matters before this had to be acted upon and prevented some being taken up but that it would probably be reached by May 1st.
