The open season for shooting partridge is in Bown closed last Wednesday.

The dairymen of Salisbury have advanced the price of milk from 10 to 12 1/2 cents per quart.

J D Dorsett of Spencer, who owns some valuable land in the heart of Badiu, was at that place last week looking after the sale of some lots.

The county commencement will be held Friday, April 6th, and it is hoped it will be the biggest in the history.

The Y M C A in Spencer contemplates the erection of an addition to its present commodious building at a cost of \$25,000.

Sheriff Krider ended his first of the year tax collecting round of the county at Barber Friday and it proved very successful in spite inclement weather and bad roads.

Mayor Walter H Woodson has given notice that he will be a candidate to succeed himself before the Democratic city primaries to be held in April. The election will be held about the first of May.

W J Swain, an attorney of Winston-Salem, has been employed to bring suit against Spark's World Famous Shows by Willie Cradlock who was injured while traveling with the show in 1915. The damage asked for is \$10,000.

The room in the Colonial theatre building, recently vacated by Mr McDaniel as a grocery store, is to be fitted up for a tailoring establishment and gents furnishing house by Baltimore parties.

The old county jail, corner of Main and Liberty streets with walls two feet thick, and a great deal more substantial than many buildings now being occupied, was reported to have been condemned and ordered removed.

An ordinance to prohibit minors in public places and one to require the street car company to turn white passengers out at the front door and Negroes at the rear door as each occupy the respective ends of the car this may prove more convenient.

Chas A Klutz, a well known undertaker formerly connected with George W Wright, undertaker, here for some time, has accepted a similar position in Albemarle and will move his family there in the near future.

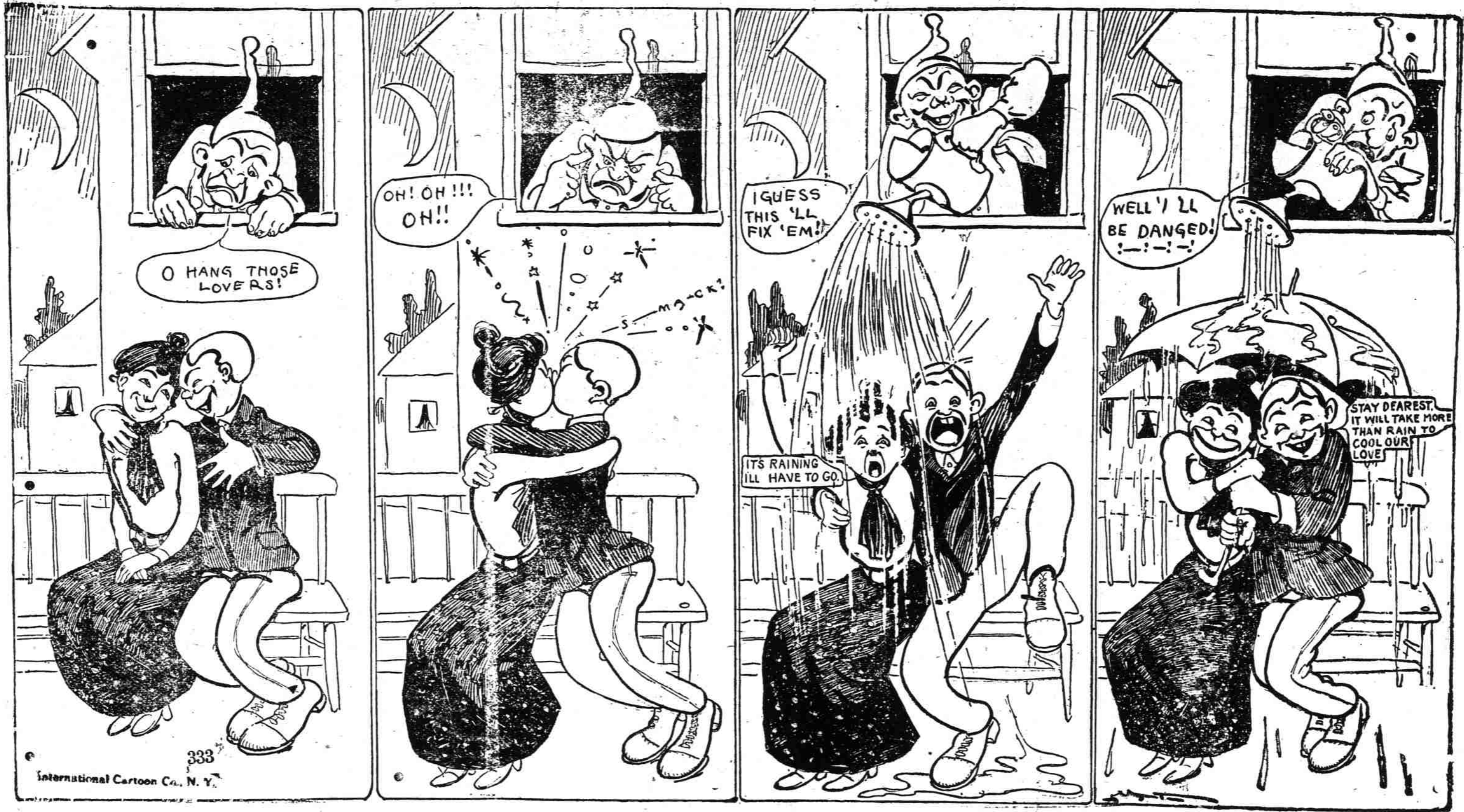

Up to noon the day's report of vessels sunk in the new German submarine campaign totaled nine of an aggregate of more than 12,000 tons. The largest of the reported sinkings was the British steamer Crownpoint, a 5,218 tons vessel. The probable sinking of the British steamer Azul
