"Second: Public eating places ad clubs to observe two wheatTednesday, as at present, mor readstuffs, macaroni, crackers astry, pies, cakes, wheat break ast cereals, containing total our to be served unless specifi. es not to buy more pating plaes not to buy more than six pounds of wheat products per
nonth per guest, thus conform ng with limitations requested of ouseholders
Third: Retailers not to sell dore than one eighth of a barre:
o any town customer at any one time and not more than one uarter of a barrel to any counry customer at any one time and in no case to sell wheat products
without the sale of an equal weight of other cereals.
"Fourth: We ask the bakers
