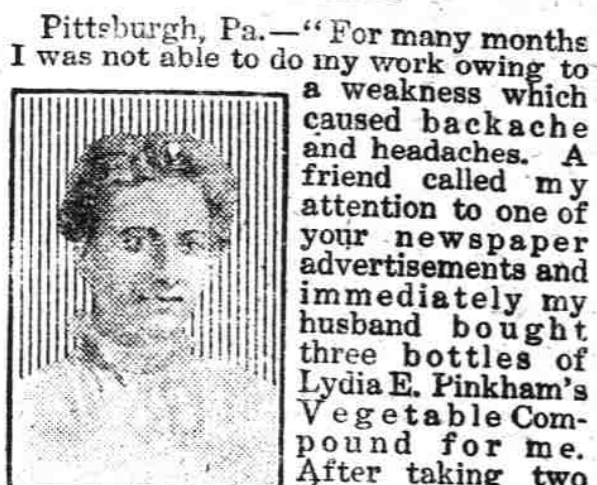

In Case Germany Should Refuse to Sign Treaty.

Paris, Thursday, April 17.—Military experts under the direction of Marshal Foch have been charged with the drafting of a report on what should be done in the event that Germany refuses to sign the treaty of peace. It is indicated that the methods of coercion which the allies would adopt may include the occupation of more German territory, the blockade of enemy ports, and the discontinuance of the dispatch of food supplies to Germany.

Paris, April 23.—Grave doubts were expressed today whether the projected peace treaty would be presented to the German representatives the coming Friday. While the treaty will be communicated to them in substance, it was said in well informed circles that it would be physically impossible to prepare the document in its complete final form in the four days remaining.

China Grove Farm Life School in Need of New Dormitory.

China Grove, April 19.—Dr. E. C. Brooks, State superintendent of public instruction, and Prof. T. E. Broome spent Friday in China Grove and Salisbury, in an effort to add another dormitory to the Farm Life School at China Grove.

The teachers and students, some two hundred in number, assembled at the depot to greet the distinguished visitors. The situation and the needs of the institution and the officers and directors of the institution, a review of the high school students, a short, but eloquent address by Dr. Brooks and luncheon at the Farm Life school concluded the visit.

The afternoon was spent in Salisbury, where a special joint session of the county school board and the county commissioner met Dr. Brooks and the Farm Life school committee. Every phase of the matter, the new school laws recently enacted by the legislature and the urgent need of another dormitory to carry on the work successfully was presented by Dr. Brooks and A. H. Boyden.

A hearty endorsement was given by the farmers' union and the county board of education, the county commissioners reserving their decision until their next regular meeting, when it is assumed the matter will receive a most hearty approval.
