At a meeting of the Volunteers, an insulting paper was prepared denouncing the United States and pledging the signers never to allow a compliance with the demands. Subsequently a better feeling prevailed. The estates of eighteen American citizens have been unconditionally released.

Passengers by the steamer Wilming ton, from Havana, state that the Americans in Havana are treated insultingly and have no redress. They have great difficulty in getting copies of papers. The authorities do not wish to divulge what is going on in Havana. The transmission of Havana papers by mail has been stopped.

Improvements. . . At 12 o'clock the bill to insure the completion of the Western Railroad was taken up as the special order. Mr. Morehead, of Guilford, stated the object of the bill to be, as its title

indicated, the completion of what is generally known as the Coalfield Road, and provides that in the first instance the private stockholders should have all the State's interest in the Road upon the completion of the Road, the Road not to be considered completed until passenger trains run from Fay-etteville to Greensboro'. The State's interest amounted to the nominal sum of about \$6 NO, ONO, but from his best information the real interest was not worth more than \$60,000. That if the private stockholders failed to file the ond ecuditional by the time limited, then any corporation, under the law of this State, might do the same. That there was nothing concealed or covered up in the bill-it was a plain proposition, easily understood, and the only question was, would the State's inter est be better served by the completion of the Road, or by retaining its pres-ent interest in the present condition

of the Road. Several amendments were offered and adopted, provided that the bill as amended should be referred to the Committee and printed after it passed its second reading.

Mr. Welch said that the Senate

could not be too cautious in whetting down the State interest in its corpora tions. The State interest in this road tions. The State interest in this road was said to be only nominal by the Senator from Guilford. He was credibly informed that the \$600,000, the State's interest in this road, could be sold for that amount in her own State bonds other than areaid tax bonds. bonds, other than special tax bonds, or it could be sold for \$100,000 in cash, with a guarantee to complete the road to Ore Hill, twelve miles beyond the proposed terminus, Greensboro. The Sepate had had some experience in a similar proposition as the one now offered, by the Wilmington, Charlotte & Rutherford Railroad, where it first surrendered its first mortgage to aid its completion, then its second, third and fourth, and now it was all gone. He was unwilling to sacrifice in this way all the property of the State, leaving nothing to meet its liabilities

with. Messrs, Troy and Morehead replied to the argument advanced by Mr. Welch, stating that the interest in this road had been offered for sale until the repeal of the act, and could have been bought for less than the to complete it that other corporations were anxious to buy in order to defeat this measure.

The bill passed its second reading. The consideration of the bill to consolidate the Western North Carolina Railroad with the North Carolina Rail road, was next taken up as the special

The propositions of this bill are well known, as the title of the bill indicates the consolidation of these two importaut thoroughfares named. Self's Motion Befused-No Injunction Granted.

It will be seen from the opinion of Judges Bond and Brooks, published below, that the motion for an injunc-Jenkins, Public Treasurer of North Carolina, has been refused. We copy rom the official records : "In case of Self vs. Jenkins, Tresurer

we have concluded to, announce the opinion of the Court, without, at shis time, giving our reason for the conclu-sion to which we have come. The pressure of the ordinary business of the term upon our time would pre-

vent our doing so satisfactorily at this

We are of the opinion-lat: That the acts of the General Assembly of North Carolina of 1868-'69, which authorized the issue of Special Tax Bouds which are the subject of this suit, are valid acts, and that the acts of 1870-'71 which were intended to modily or repeal the acts of 1868 '69, are inconstitutional and void, being obpoxious to that clause of the Constitu tion of the United States which forbids

the State to pass any law impairing the bligations of a contract. We are of the opinion that a bong-fide holder of a bond issued under the acts in question is not precluded from receiving the amount of his debt, be cause the fact is that at the time of issuing his bond the State bonds were not at par, nor by reason of the non-fulfillment of any of the previous conditions imposed upon the Legislature before it issued the bonds.

It is sufficient, we think, if the power to issue the bonds is given and was exercised. The Legislature, and not the purchaser, is to see to the fulfillment of the conditions imposed upon the exercise of its power.

We are of the opinion, however, it is not shown in this case that any irreparable injury is likely to ocur to the com plainant by reason of any proposed action of defendant, and we shall therefore refuse the injunction prayed, and let the complainant await whatever relief he may be entitled to after final hearing.

It will be seen that the Judges de-cide that the bonds issued in 1868-'69 are constitutional, and that the subsequent legislation repealing the appropriations are unconstitutional and void. But, inasmuch as no irreparable infury threatened, the injunction is refused. We have only space to day to express our gratification at that part of the decision which relieves the State Treasury. That portion of the opinion touching the constitutionality of the touching the constitutionality of the bonds is only incidental. That point was not argued fully by the counsel for the Treasurer.—Raleigh News.


