BREAKING GROUND.

WE ARE gratified to learn that the Midland North Carolina Railroad Company commenced work at Goldsboro last Monday. Ground was broken by Mr. Biser, President of the Company, with about sixty laborers, which number is to be increased as rapidly as they can be obtained. The right of way having been secured, the work, it is said will be pushed forward vigorously. We are gratified to note this evidence of good faith on the part of the Midland Company, and hope that they will persevere until they reach Salisbury. The multiplication of railroads and railroad facilities, is what we need in North Carolina, and any corporation is to be regarded as a benefactor which invests its capital in those enterprises. The much abused Richmond & Danville Company have conferred incalculable benefits upon the people of this State, by railroads which they have built and are building, under difficulties which would have deterred a less energetic and determined Company. Overcoming every obstacle which was thrown in their way, they are pressing forward to-day with almost super-human energy to carry out their contract with the State in good faith. Let Mr. Biser and his Company do the same, and the people of the State will forget failures of the past, and award them a full measure of praise for all the benefits they confer. But we want no demonstrations for mere effect and to cover up ulterior designs, no paper railroad projects to aid in accomplishing an unjust and inequitable purpose. Fair play is a jewel which cannot be too highly prized, and we greatly mistake the temper of the people of this State if they will tolerate any actual or premeditated injustice to any person or corporation that acts in good faith. It may be said that they are averse to being humbugged, to having expectations created that were never meant to be realized, and that they will not be swift to forget any attempt to practice upon their credulity. The time has about arrived when they will no longer "listen to the voice of the charmer, Charin he never so wisely."

WRECKING AND ROBBING TRAINS.

QUITE A malia seems to prevail in different parts of the Country, for wrecking and robbing railroad trains. In California, Missouri and Arkansas, train robberies have been of such frequent occurrence of late as to become quite alarming. An attempt was made the other day, by highwaymen in California, to wreck a train for the purpose of capturing millionaire PAIR, whom they expected to hold as a hostage, until a heavy ransom was paid. The robbery of a train recently near Kansas City in Missouri, by the JAMES BROTHERS, and the more recent daring and successful robbing of the Express agent and passengers on the Iron Mountain railroad in Arkansas, in open daylight by an undisguised band of young men, shows how popular this method of "raising the wind" is becoming, and calls for prompt action and severe punishment on the part of the civil authorities. A few instances have occurred in North Carolina, of train wrecking, in all of which we believe the guilty parties have been promptly arrested and punished. Our laws punish severely and very properly all attempts to jeopardize the lives of passengers. Occasionally we hear of a rock being thrown at a train, or through the window of a passenger coach, and sometimes of an obstruction being placed upon a railroad track, but such instances, to the credit of our people, are of rare occurrence.

CERTAIN AMBITIOUS REPRESENTATIVES OF THE SMITH FAMILY

have been discussing through the columns of the News-Observer, the question, whether speculating in "cotton futures" is gambling? JOHN maintains the affirmative and PETER the negative, and so that world-renowned and venerable house is divided against itself. Without venturing an opinion upon this delicate question, which has divided the laity of more than one ecclesiastical body, we think the practice is very much to be deprecated. The smiles of the fickle goddess are hard to win, as many of our friends, who have been indulging in this species of speculation could testify. But really, are we not rapidly becoming a nation of gamblers? What are the stock operators, grain and provision speculators, as well as lottery dealers, but gamblers?

SPECULATION is already rife as to changes likely to be made by President ARTHUR, in the present Cabinet, and also as to the policy of his administration. At this early day, and with scanty information which has been authoritatively furnished, but little can be predicted as to the future course of the new President. Belonging to the Stewart wing of the Republican party, which developed such strength at the Chicago Convention, it has been feared that GRANT, LOGAN, CONKLING and CAMERON would be able to influence him to discard the policy of his immediate predecessors and re-institute the "Old Grant Regime." If he permits himself to be influenced by the general sentiment of the country, as enunciated in the resolutions passed by the Convention of Governors at Cleveland recently, public expectation will be satisfied; the great loss which country has sustained will soon cease to be so keenly felt, and all sections will heartily co-operate with him in making his administration successful and honorable to himself, and a blessing to the country.

The resolutions to which we refer, will be found on the first page of this paper.

GENERAL GRANT and EX-President HAYES attended the funeral of President GARFIELD, at Cleveland. General GRANT it is said appeared to be absorbed in thought and maintained a stolid, vacant look during the whole of the ceremonies. He received but little attention, and EX-President HAYES, still less. Neither have patronage or place to bestow now, and may occasion the difference which both must feel.
