COMMISSIONERS MEETING.—The county commissioners met Monday, April 3rd, 1882. The following commissioners were present: Jno. D. Wells, chairman, D. G. W. Ward, B. A. Howard, John H. Barnes and Wiley Deans.

Several were exempted from paying their poll tax for 1881. W. J. Harris, C. Barnes & Co., Joe Lamm, of Wilson, and J. B. Williams & Co., of Toisnot were granted license to retail liquor. K. H. Watson, James Draughn and Wm. Daniel were appointed as a committee to locate and assess the damages for a public school in district No. 7. Quite a number were relieved from double tax.

The following were appointed to take the taxes for the various townships in this county: Wilson, W. F. Mercer; Black Creek, Robt. M. Cox; Cross Roads, T. A. Thompson; Spring Hill, Simon Barnes; Old Fields, Frank Edman; Taylors, Jos. J. Farmer; Toisnot, W. C. Battle; Gardner, Wm. Woodard, Jr.; Saratoga, T. B. Eades; Stantonsburg, Jonathan Applewhite. After making the usual allowances the board adjourned.

RAIL ROAD MEETING.—By order of our worthy mayor, Mr. P. E. Hines, a meeting was called to meet Mr. Jonathan Haven, an agent of Mr. W. J. Best last night at the court house to consider the feasibility of running a railroad from Kingston to Greenville via Snow Hill and Hookerton and a branch road from Snow Hill to Wilson. The meeting was called to order by calling Mr. A. W. Rowland to the chair, Mr. M. T. Moye was appointed Secretary. Mr. Haven showed the advantages, necessarily arising from having Wilson connected with the sea coast. He further requested that the people of our town send delegates to meet Mr. W. J. Best at Kingston to-day, whereupon Mr. H. G. Connor moved that five delegates be appointed to meet Mr. Best, three of these from town and two from the country. The following delegates were appointed: Messrs. F. W. Barnes, T. J. Hadley, R. W. King, D. G. W. Ward and Col. G. W. Stanton. On motion the chairman and secretary were added to the list. Maj. Henry J. Rogers, Vice-President and Col. McAlpine, chief engineer of the Seaboard & Raleigh Railroad were introduced to the meeting. Maj. Rogers and Col. McAlpine both responded in a few very appropriate remarks. Col. McAlpine informed the meeting that he would remain a few days in town in the interest of the Seaboard & Raleigh Railroad. There being no other business before the house the meeting adjourned.

BLACK CREEK, N. C., April 6th '82. EDITOR ADVANCE.—You have not heard from us in some time. Our town is now assuming a much more business like and cheerful appearance since the location of R. J. Taylor & Co's, mills at this place, and the building of a railroad has become a certainty. The railroad has been surveyed and opened some four miles, the cross ties are being cut and distributed from one of the mills as rapidly as possible. The arrival of a new engine to be used on the new road is expected in a few weeks. The laying of the iron will precede it of course. Wilson may look well to her laurels while she does the talking Black Creek will do the building of a railroad, in fact Black Creek has already "got the coon and gone on." There is an abundance of timber between here and Florence, South Carolina.

We have five factories running, one shoe factory, one cigar factory and three tangle leg factories in full blast besides numerous other enterprises. We have two large brick manufacturing establishments, aside and a carriage factory. 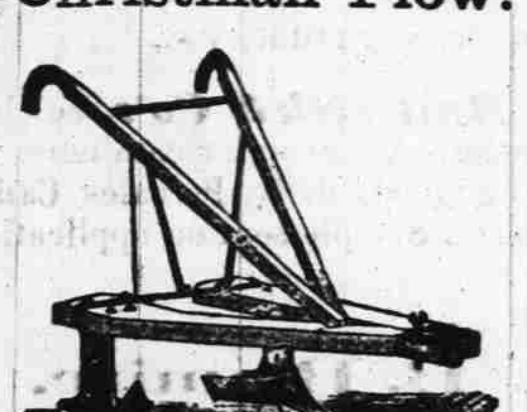
