Bryan Esq., was elected Mayor of Goldsboro. Mr. M. J. Edwards, a former citizen of Wilson, was elected Mayor of Laurensburg. Mr. J. A. Crews has accepted a position as travelling Agent of Zion's Landmark. Mr. Jno. E. Woodard has been absent this week in Wilmington on professional business. Mr. Mehagan is in town teaching a dancing school. He thinks also of starting a skating rink. Rev. W. P. Blake, of Weldon, preached in the Missionary Baptist Church Sunday night. There is some talk of getting Dr. Talmage to lecture in Oxford for the benefit of the Orphan Asylum. In this issue of the ADVANCE Geo. D. Green & Co. remind our readers that now is the time to plant. A number of our farmers who planted their cotton early in the season are now busy replanting. Beaton & Boonie are the successors to the firm of Kader Biggs & Co., Commission Merchants, Norfolk, Va. The last issue of Zion's Landmark, published at this place, was considerably enlarged and otherwise improved. Rev. J. H. Gunn, who was prevented by serious illness, from filling his pulpit last Sunday, is, we are glad to know, convalescing. Among the convicts released from the penitentiary last week were Hyman, white, and Joseph Bain, colored, from Wilson county. The Davidson Dispatch is the name of a new paper published at Lexington by our friend, T. B. Eldredges. We wish it much success. Mr. E. Hulds, Post Master at New Bern has resigned to take a position as Special Agent of the Treasury in the Customs department. The Concord Sun brings us five seven feet nine inches long and rust proof oats five feet seven inches, with stalks as big as an ordinary lead pencil. Our observation is that there has been more visible improvement in the State press during 1882 than for any whole year since the war. It is an encouraging sign. The Farmer & Mechanic says that Col. Kenan whose name has been mentioned prominently for the nomination of Congressman at large, declines to allow his name to be used. Mr. Moore, Register of Deeds tells us that there were \$760,452 worth of dry goods, groceries, &c. bought in Wilson county for the year 1881. Also \$16,402 for spirit liquors. It is stated that there were nine applicants before the board of commissioners for the position as Policeman. This goes to prove that Ohionians are not the only ones seeking office. Mrs. Oldham was a sister of Mr. P. D. Gold, in this place, and a daughter of Mrs. Pipkin. She was an estimable Christian woman and we sympathize with the relatives in the sad loss they have sustained. At the sale of the Morehead City Hotel under a laborers' lien John Giffing Esq., of Raleigh became the purchaser at \$35,000 for the building and furniture. Dr. Blackwell will continue to conduct the hotel. The closing exercises of Elder A. J. Moore's school at Whitakers Academy, Whitakers, N. C. will take place on the 26th, of May. The literary address will be delivered at 2 o'clock P. M. by Hugh F. Murray Esq., of Wilson. We hear that our young townsman Frank A. Daniels, Esq., has accepted an invitation to deliver the literary address at the closing exercises of Dupont Classical and Mathematical School on 24th of May.—Goldsboro Messenger.

We are glad to note that Mr. W. P. Wooten, of Wilson, was elected E. W. Grand Patriarch of the Grand Encampment which met in Wilmington this week. We learn from a prospectus sent us that Rev. Jos. E. Carter a former pastor of the Missionary Baptist Church in Wilson, and Rev. D. B. Nelson, President of Judson College, will shortly publish at Hendersonville, a new paper called the Blue Ridge Baptist. The Episcopal Convention is in session at Tarboro this week. Rev. B. S. Bronson, H. G. Connor Esq., J. G. Rawles and A. W. Rowland are in attendance from St. Timothy's church. We have been promised a report of the proceedings which we shall publish next week. We learn from Mr. Jno. Y. Moore, outrentice Register of Deeds, that there were 105 marriage licenses granted in Wilson county from Nov. 1st, 1881 to April 1st, 1882, as against 70 for the same period of the preceding year. Of these 48 were white and 57 colored. This is an encouraging statement. We learn from the Kingston Free Press that Mr. Best has sent out a corps of engineers and surveyors starting at that place to survey the proposed Y road from Kingston to Greenville via Snow Hill with a branch to Wilson. We fear the road is as near completion as it will ever be. We learn that in a private letter to Superintendent Tomlinson, Governor Jarvis says he purposes visiting the State Normal School at this place during the coming season. The Governor also refers in highly complimentary terms to the graded school of whose repute and excellent workings he has heard such gratifying reports. The Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows has been in session at Wilmington this week. They were present from Wilson Enterprise Lodge W. P. Wooten, J. J. Barefoot, J. T. Cobb, L. D. Tomlinson, Ed. Farmer, Jno. E. Woodard, and Capt. J. H. Baker who was accompanied by his wife. We return thanks to Mr. J. H. T. Baker, of Nash county, Chief Marshal, for an invitation to attend the commencement exercises at Rutherford College which will be held May 23rd and 24th. The annual sermon will be preached by Rev. James Atkins, at Asheville, and the annual address will be delivered by Governor Jarvis. In our hurry to get to press last week, occasioned by the increased work, the types made us make several blunders which we regret very much. For instance in the E. Himes, it was published "E. Himes, Ind.," and "S. B. Waters, Ind.," when both of them are Democrats of long standing. We shall endeavor to keep such errors from occurring again. The entries for three of the races that takes place during the fair, closes on the first of June. These are the Breeders' Stakes, the Edgecombe Derby, and the Stallion Stakes. The stakes will probably be very large. The Association alone gives enough to each to make the stakes worth competing for. First-class horses.—Tarboro Southern.

On last Saturday evening a most terrible catastrophe occurred in the town of Black Creek, in this county, about six miles from Wilson. It seems that a time a colored woman named Rachel Saunders and a colored boy named Matthew Dawson were sitting on the steps of Dr. S. Woodard's store, and Lee, son of Dr. Woodard, was standing in the door, when a bolt of lightning struck the store, killing the two negroes outright and stunning the boy who was thought to be dead, but he recovered during the night and is now as well as could be expected, and is able to be out. Dr. Woodard and others who were in the store were slightly shocked, but sustained no serious injury. Very little damage beyond the cracking of the plastering was done to the building. It has been currently reported that three or four parties were killed, but such reports were exaggerated and the above are the facts as given to us by Dr. Anderson who was called down Saturday night immediately after the shock. Murder in Pitt. On Tuesday morning, May 2nd, as a friend informs us, a most revolting murder took place in Pitt county eight miles below Greenville. The particulars of the murder are in brief that there was a feud of long standing between two brothers, William and Henry Hattock, the cause of which we are not informed. On Monday Henry Hattock was in Greenville and was seen after eleven o'clock at night on the streets in an intoxicated condition, and on Tuesday morning about sunrise he went to his brother's house. He was met at the door by his brother's wife, (Mr. Wm. Hattock being absent attending to his duties on the farm) and immediately knocked her down and began beating her. The children, attracted by her cries, ran to her rescue, when he hurled them violently against the wall. At this juncture of affairs Mr. Wm. Hattock came in and attempted to stop his brother in a hand to hand conflict without effect, and seeing that his uncle was beating both his father and mother, the little son, aged twelve years, raised his shotgun, took deliberate aim, fired and killed his uncle. One of the shot took effect in his right temple and two in his neck. He only lived about an hour after being shot. A coroner's inquest was held and a verdict of justifiable homicide was rendered. Both the brothers are in good circumstances, and of respectable families, and the sad event has cast a gloom over both families and their friends. Municipal Matters. The new board of town commissioners was organized May 9th, G. W. Blount elected Secretary and Treasurer. D. P. Christman Chief of Police, W. P. Snakenberg and O. G. Jones assistants, the last named not to take his position until September 1st. Salary of Chief \$50; that of assistants, \$35 each. G. H. Horne was reappointed keeper of cemeteries and lamp-lighter at a salary of \$500 per annum, he to furnish oil and glass as heretofore. Notice was ordered to be given P. Linehan and R. R. Bridgers, owners of the brick stores, corner of Nash and Goldsboro Sts., to drain cellars and put them in such condition as to keep them dry, within 30 days from the service of notice or they would be condemned and filled (A committee of physicians have already reported them, in the present condition, a fruitful cause of disease). On motion it was ordered that the Mayor be empowered to suspend or remove from office any policeman found guilty of violation of law—neglect of duty—or the frequenting of, or drinking in, bar rooms while on duty. An account in favor of W. F. Mercer for revising the registration books allowed and ordered to be paid. G. W. Blount was elected Mayor pro tem. Salary of Mayor fixed at \$300 per annum, same as heretofore. J. E. Woodard, G. W. Blount, and J. T. Wiggins appointed to revise ordinances. Nashville. MR. EDITOR: The railroad fever has again broken out among our people and about \$12,000 has been subscribed to build a tram road to Rocky Mount, but as the people of that place seem to take so little interest in the enterprise there is some talk of trying to build either to Sharpsburg or Whitakers. We want some kind of a road and are not particular where it comes from nor where it goes to so we get it to Nashville. The third quarterly meeting for Nashville Circuit will be held at Bethlehem the 4th Sunday in May. Dr. Cross, the Presiding Elder, is slowly improving and expects to be able to attend. He has gone to the springs. The funeral of the late John H. Rackley, Esq., will be preached by Rev. Geo. M. Duke 3 1/2 miles southwest of Nashville on the 4th Sunday in May. The funeral ceremonies will be conducted by the Masonic Fraternity of which he was a member. Members of neighboring lodges are invited to attend. Mr. W. J. Newby and family will move to Bennettsville, South Carolina in a few days. Nashville, N. C., May 10, 1882.

A shooting affray occurred near Dawson's Cross Roads between W. P. Whitehead and Samuel Dowberry, both receiving severe wounds. The young men of Enfield have a nice skating rink. The engine on W. T. Pitt, a committee of three consisting of J. I. Lewis, W. F. Walston and C. Pitt, were appointed to draft resolutions expressive of the sense of the meeting, after having retired for a few moments the committee returned the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted. Whereas, we, the citizens of No. 10 township have heard there is a prospect that a Railroad is likely to be constructed from the Albemarle section to Raleigh, therefore Resolved, That we cordially invite the President and Stockholders of the Seaboard and Raleigh Railroad to investigate this section as we think this a favorable line to build a road. If they wish to locate said road through a thrifty section, all of which needs Railroad facilities. Resolved, That we are willing to take stock to a liberal extent, provided, there be any assurance a road is to be located on the lower part of Edgecombe county. A Sensation. A preacher who gave his name as Geo. D. Mealy visited our town last week, and by singing and preaching gathered quite a crowd about him to listen to what he called a sermon.
