**Graded School Meeting.**

According to notice previously given the citizens met Friday night for the purpose of considering the interests of the Graded School. Rev. B. S. Bronson was called to the chair and Mr. M. T. Moye requested to act as Secretary. The chairman on taking his seat called on Mr. T. J. Hadley to explain the object of the meeting. Mr. Hadley responded in a few appropriate remarks relative to the limits of the Graded School District, and the election of permanent trustees by the citizens. The Committee appointed by the Board of Trustees to prepare a bill reported through its chairman, H. G. Connor Esq., which report was ordered to be transmitted to our representatives at Raleigh with the request that they submit it to the legislature. The bill provides that the tax shall not exceed  $\frac{1}{2}$  of one per cent on personal property and real estate and not to exceed \$100 of the poll. The following were elected the permanent trustees of the school: T. J. Hadley, R. J. Taylor, Warren Woodard, G. D. Green, G. W. Blount, H. G. Connor, H. C. Moss, M. Rountree, and M. T. Moye.
