DECREASE IN ALL FAILURES.

That in Manufacturing L nes Most Note worthy - Dun's Report.

NEW YORK, February 9 .- R. G. Dun & Co. in their report on failures, say The failures reported for the month of January show an aggregate of \$15,-103,209, liabilities against \$29,843,028 lest year, and in manufacturing only \$3,728,587 against \$11,589,715 last year, while in trading the liabilities were \$'1,055,105 against \$17,234,537 last year. The remarkable large decrease in manufacturing failures deserve the more attention because prices of manufactured products have so greatly declined during the year, and the output has been greatly reduced. Failures for the past week have been 261 in the United States, against 385 last year, and 58 in Canada against 60 last year.
