A WEEK'S NEWS CONDENSED

Tuesday, May 12. Philadelphia was the hottest place in the country yesterday...

The greater New York bill, creating a city of over 3,100,000 population, was signed by Governor Morton.

The boiler of the Mississippi towboat Harry Brown exploded twenty-five miles below Vicksburg, Miss., and eleven lives were lost.

H. C. Banner, editor of Puck, New York's illustrated humorous weekly, died of consumption yesterday at his home in Nutley, N. J., aged 41.

Francis A. Daly was awarded \$35,000 by a Boston jury for the loss of a leg, which was cut off by a Lynn and Boston street car in 1891, when he was 15 years old.

Wednesday, May 13. John I. Wallace and three sons, aged 20, 18 and 6, were killed by lightning near Cadiz, Ky.

A cyclone created great damage to property at Lincoln and Elkhorn, Neb., but no fatalities are reported.

The equestrian statue of General Hancock was unveiled at Washington yesterday, President Cleveland presiding at the exercises.

Ex-Police Captain Carpenter, of New York, was sentenced to three months' imprisonment in the penitentiary and \$1,500 fine, for bribery.

Eight members of the school board of St. Louis have been fined \$25 each and sentenced to ten days' imprisonment for contempt of court.

Walter Pierce, who was married on Monday at Haron, Ind., shot at a party of serenaders, and his brother Frank dropped dead. Walter was arrested.

Delaware's Republican convention ended in a split and two sets of delegates to St. Louis, headed by J. Edward Addicks and Senator Higgins, respectively. Addicks carried the regular convention.

Thursday, May 14. At Lexington, Ky., Miss Mazie Todd, aged 20, a niece of President Lincoln, was killed by a trolley car while she was bicycling.

At Yreka, Cal., Mrs. Henry Schwatka and 6-year-old daughter were killed by their Chinese cook, who then committed suicide.

The river and harbor bill was passed by the national senate, but the house has refused to concur, and the bill goes to conference.

John C. Tarsney, recently unseated as a member of congress from Missouri, has been appointed associate justice of Oklahoma Territory's supreme court.

Friday, May 15. A committee of Philadelphia's councils reported favorably an ordinance to increase firemen's salaries.

At Newport, Ky., Scott Jackson was convicted of murder in the first degree and sentenced to death for the murder of Pearl Bryan.

It is said that Major McKinley's managers have decided upon General Horace Porter, of New York, as the vice presidential candidate in the event of McKinley's nomination.

William H. Daly and William W. Reed, aged 20 and 18, respectively, are under arrest for incendiarism at Cambridge, Mass. They confess setting fifty fires, causing over \$2,000,000 loss.

Saturday, May 16. Rear Admiral T. H. Stevens, U. S. N., retired, died yesterday at Rockville, Md., aged 77.

The people of Milwaukee are boycotting the street railways, owing to the unsuccessful strike of employees.

By a vote of 31 to 30, the national senate decided that Henry A. Dupont was not entitled to a seat as senator from Delaware.

A Bulwuyay dispatch says: A party under Captains Grey and Wrey attacked and routed a body of Matabele near Theba Indans, killing nearly eighty.

At a park in Montreal last night the audience refused to listen to a speech by Sir Charles Tupper, premier of Canada. He was interrupted with cheers for Laurier.

Frederick, alias Frank Nelson, and Frank Lewis, alias Lewis Mansfield, were convicted last night in Washington of robbing Peter Outwater, of Paterson, N. J., with the aid of "knockout drops."

Monday, May 18. At Brewster, Mass., Fred Alexander, 80 years old, shot and killed Miss Sadie Hassard, and then committed suicide. The girl repulsed his attentions.

Wilhelmina, the 16-year-old queen of Holland, will soon be betrothed to Prince Bernhard Henry, grandson of Grand Duke Charles Alexander of Weimar-Eisenach.

The person appointed by William Q. Judge, late leader of the theosophists of the world, as his esoteric successor is Mrs. Alice Tingley, of West End avenue, New York city.

Captain Williams, Mate Charles Watson and Seamen Shira, Jones and Fitz were drowned through the sinking of their schooner, Mary D. Ayer, by the steamer Onoko in Lake Michigan, off Crosse Point.

The Oregon a Record Breaker.

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., May 15.—In her official trial trip yesterday the battleship Oregon covered sixty-two knots, the official government course, in three hours, forty minutes and forty-eight seconds, making the magnificent average speed for the time over the course of 13.78 knots, or 19.35 miles an hour.

McKinley Will Not Dictate Principles.

CLEVELAND, May 18.—Ex-Governor McKinley has caused it to be authoritatively announced that neither now nor at the St. Louis convention will he debate himself upon the currency question.

CHICAGO, May 18.—Eugene V. Debs was named for the presidency of the United States by the Chicago labor congress yesterday. The resolution provoked a discussion which consumed three hours, but it was finally adopted by a slight majority.

Murderer Hommer Sentenced to Death.

CUMBERLAND, Md., May 18.—Simon Hommer, convicted of the murder of Samuel McCarrier, alias McAllister, in Ed Cooney's saloon, this city, on the night of March 14, was denied a new trial by Judge Stake, and was sentenced to be hanged. Hommer's counsel had pleaded insanity. They have filed a motion in arrest of judgment. Governor Lowndes will fix the date of execution.

The Cashier Himself the Thief.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 18.—The man who robbed the State Bank of Buffalo, this county, last Thursday, have been captured and have made a full confession. They are Carl Kloppeburg, the cashier of the bank, and Joseph Kloppenburg, a drug clerk of this city, sons of August Kloppeburg, a wealthy citizen of Springfield. The stolen money was recovered.

Condemned Men to Have a New Trial.

LONDON, May 13.—The Madrid correspondent of The Standard says: "On Monday Spain and the United States arrived at an amicable understanding, and the Competitor prisoners will be allowed a fresh trial before the ordinary court, under the existing treaties between Spain and the United States."
