GREAT NEW YORK STRIKE MAYOR.

The New York elect gives a large cut of Mayor-elect Van Wyck, and in its sketch of him says he "is chief justice of the city Court. Was born in New York in 1850, and comes from a well known New York family of Dutch descent. Graduated from the Columbia Law school in 1872. Was identified with Tammany Hall for some years, but seceded in 1880 and helped to form the County Democracy. Later he returned to the Tammany organization. Was defeated for the city court bench in 1881, but was elected in 1889. In 1895 was chosen chief justice by his fellow justices, and in the same year was re-elected for a second term of six years. January 28, 1890, he was arrested at the French ball at the Metropolitan opera house on the charge of being drunk and disorderly, but was discharged next morning by Justice White." As to Judge Van Wyck's birth place and ancestry, this is about as accurate as yellow journalism usually is. The little ball his tory is unhappily true. The judge is a bachelor, 47 years old, but still one of the boys, and New York is apt to be wide open during his term as mayor.

NO FENCE LAW.

The stock law is becoming a general thing in certain sections of the county. Some time ago Selma adopted it and, since then, the farmers of the surrounding country have joined in until now the territory embraces a very large area, extending from Pineville to a point several miles south of Smithfield.

But a few years ago the people of Johnston were very averse to the stock law or no fence idea and aspirants for office were careful not to champion its cause. Each land owner has the privilege of adopting it, and they are availing themselves of the opportunity.

All authorities agree that one cow properly kept will give more milk and butter than four which run at large. The fence is a time honored custom, but it must eventually go. Why not get rid of it before the farmer is forced, by lack of material, to let it rot down?
