



Trick Pony Crushed to Doat's and a Watchman Serlans's ' . Philadelphia, Nov. 15 .- 1 be 1 111conda, on exhibition in a museum here, vesterday severely injured Samuel Mosher, the museum watchman, and crushed to death a valuable trick pony. The pony was tied to a feed box alongside the anaconda's cage. Mosher saw that the reptile had worked one of the boards of its cage loose and had stretched its tail out a short distance. 
