OUR NEW VOLUME.

This number of the News is the first of its Seventh Volume. At such a time it is not out of order to give a slight review of its work in the past, and review the pledges for its career.

The ROANOKE NEWS was established by Messrs. Stone and Uzzell in 1868, and was run by them, constantly growing in popularity and influence until 1872, when they went to Raleigh for the purpose of establishing the Daily News in that city, and in leaving a letter to the ROANOKE NEWS to the Manning Brothers.

Under the control of these gentlemen the NEWS lost nothing of the high reputation and large popularity it enjoyed while under the management of Messrs. Stone and Uzzell and it was at all times regarded as the representative Democratic paper of North Eastern Carolina. In January 1876 the Manning Brothers established the Daily News at Danville, Va., and Mr. W. T. Manning of the firm removed to that town to assume editorial control of the young paper. Dr. H. E. T. Manning retained possession of the ROANOKE NEWS until February 1877, when he sold the same to Capt. T. L. Enry and moving to Baltimore established the Medical Record in connection with Dr. T. A. Ashby.

Under the ownership of Capt. Enry Andrew J. Burton Esq. was called to the editorial management of the NEWS. He brought to its columns the ready pen of a practiced writer, and under his editorship, the editorials of the NEWS attracted more attention than at any previous time in its history. The NEWS continued under the editorship of Mr. Burton until September 1877, when it came into the hands of its present owners.

O. its career since that time we prefer that others should speak, and we prefer too, that our promises for the future should be gathered from our past records.

DEATH OF JUDGE BIGGS.

Hon. Asa Biggs, of the firm of Kuder Biggs & Co., died in Norfolk at 12 o'clock Wednesday the 6th inst. The immediate cause of his death was rheumatic gout.

Judge Biggs was born in Martin county, North Carolina, on the 4th of February, 1811. He was licensed to practice law in 1831, entered public life in 1840 as a member of the House of Commons from Martin, was re-elected in 1842, and went to the State Senate in 1844. In 1845 he was elected to Congress from the First District, beating Hon. David O'Neal, and in 1847 was in turn defeated by Mr. O'Neal. In 1850 he was re-elected, conjointly with the late Judge Simpson, and in 1852, with Hon. B. F. Moore, to revise the statutes of the State, and the result of their joint labors, the Revised Code, would, of itself, have been sufficient to have kept green the memories of each of the co-laborers.

In 1854 Judge Biggs was again elected to the Legislature from Martin and by the Legislature of 1854 and 1855 he was elected to the United States Senate. This position he resigned for the purpose of accepting the United States District Judgeship, which position he held until the breaking out of the war, when he resigned and was at once appointed District Judge of the Confederate States.

At the close of the war Judge Biggs resumed the practice of law with marked success and continued in the practice until 1869, when he, in company with Chief Justice Smith, went to Norfolk and opened a law office.

Judge Biggs leaves a family of three sons and three daughters. Capt. Wm. Biggs, of the Oxford Free Lance, being the eldest of his sons.

PEACE IN EUROPE.

There seems to be no longer room for doubt that the inevitable European conflict has been postponed for the present. The treaty of peace has been signed and England, it seems, will content herself with grudging. We are glad of this. War is a thing to be, at all times, avoided, and by all proper means to be avoided, and while we are inclined to hope that war between the great European powers would have acted as a stimulus to certain American industries, we think that its result to the peaceful states would have been of a most disastrous nature.

At peace is certain we look for a rise in cotton. But we do not think the farmers against being lulled into planting too large areas in the staple. We have noticed for some years that there is always a little flurry in the cotton market about planting time. This generally has the effect intended of causing a large acreage to be planted, and having had this effect cotton begins to go down and reaches its lowest figures about the time the farmers are forced to sell their

cotton on the market. We think this year will be no exception to the rule, and we warn our friends against the trick.

A BUSTED COMMONWEALTH.

Last Tuesday the Auditor of Virginia sent for the chairman of the legislative committee on Finance and informed them that there was only \$103 left in the Treasury, that the banks, to whom the State already owes \$175,000, had refused to make further advances and that, to use a slightly figurative phrase the old thing wouldn't work any longer.

This, we believe, the first instance on record of a flit broke commonwealth and that such a fate should have overtaken the mother of States, and statesmen of course horrible to contemplate, but at the same time as the Congress will probably lead to the immediate adjournment of the Virginia Legislature, we don't know but that the State is to be congratulated after all.
