THE RALEIGH OBSERVER.

The course of the paper whose name heads this article, in connection with the contest for the Federal Senatorship has for some time past been an object of seemingly great interest to certain other journals, which other journals pretend to think that the Observer is only shamming neutrality and is really being worked in the interests of Judge Merrimon. Now we are free to confess that an investigation into the motives and personal wishes of any man, whether the editor of a paper or other, is asarrant a piece of folly as an inquiry into the authorship of Junius during a hot campaign, but our love for fair play forces us to take a hand in the game so far as to say, that the record of the men who direct the course of the "Observer" is such, that their simple assertion carries with it more weight than do great oaths of many others, and that he who believes or pretends to believe that either William L. Saunders or Peter M. Hale is actuated by any motives other than those they profess must be either a knave or a fool.

THE TOWN'S HEALTH.

The gallant young gentleman who presides over the local fortunes of this paper having insisted on putting editorials in his columns, we trust we may be pardoned for advertising somewhat local matters on our editorial page, and the text from which we desire to preach is the absolute necessity of sanitary police regulations for the town of Weldon.

To begin with the side of the town next to the river, we find the canal basin in a condition such as calls imperatively for attention. Through it runs a little thread of water, on each side of which at least of acres of flat black mud, reeking with corruption and, under the fierce rays of a July sun, sending up exhalations filled with the seeds of disease and death, is exposed. Fried meat row is still in a condition which would disgrace the slums and back alleys of New York, and the main thoroughfare of the town is in a condition that renders skillful piloting necessary to cross it. The vacant lots in the bottom are in such a condition as defy decent description and from various quarters of the suburbs the effluvia from dead and decaying animals makes life a burden, and then makes amends by making it short. Now we have purposely refrained from knowing whose duty it is to look after the sanitary condition of the town, but we should be open to the charge of making a personal attack upon such officer, but we must insist in the interest of the public health that this matter shall be attended to and at once. Let the board of Commissioners, if they have not already done so, appoint an officer to look after these matters, and let him be compelled to do his full duty at all hazards.

TIME FOR WORK.

Once upon a time, before beasts lost the power of speech, there was a certain tiger, who had for a long time been the terror of the forest, but, becoming disabled by old age, he was like to perish by starvation. In this juncture he had an advertisement inserted in the county paper stating, that he had become convinced of the error of his ways, and that he desired all the animals of whose relatives he had killed any, to come to his den in order that he might seek their forgiveness. The foolish beasts were taken in by these protestations, and one by one entered the cave to hear his professions of repentance. History is silent as to the fate of these animals, the only thing that is definitely known on the subject being that none of them ever came back.

There is a lack of interest in the political campaign of this year exhibited by the gentlemen whose duty it is to superintend the organization of the Democratic party, which recalls the fable quoted above forcibly to our memory. It is now barely two weeks before the day of the election and so far nothing has been done nor has there been any symptom shown of any intention to do anything. Now we may be mistaken, but our experience in political campaigns is not such as to justify us in thinking that elections can be carried in any such way. We have been taught to believe that eternal energy is the price of success and we call upon our leaders to be up and doing.

In the ensuing election we cannot afford to base our hopes of success on the apparent divisions in the camp of the enemy. These splits have heretofore always been healed on the eve of the election and when the day for final action has come we have always found that the Radical leaders had their forces well in hand and were prepared to put their votes where they would do most good.

Nor can we afford to point to our splendid majority in the campaign of 1876 as an excuse for inaction now. It is true that in that election, we increased the vote cast for Judge Merrimon by 27,000, but we must not forget that the other party also increased its vote by about 13,000 and that out of the 110,178 votes cast for Suttle, there were at least 12,000 of white votes which had theretofore been cast for Democrats or not voted. Now there can be no doubt, that the history of politics in North Carolina shows that the Republican party always holds it own at least, and this being true, it must be apparent that any decided falling off of votes from our side may be fraught with disaster.

Another matter which may be adverted to in this connection is the resolution of the Republican executive committee not to make any contest for the State. Now this may mean exactly what it purports to, but the past record of that party is not such as gives one any over-optimistic confidence in its honesty of purpose and we trust we may be pardoned for saying that we certainly will not take a thing as true solely because the Republican Executive Committee says it is true.

But this article is so rapidly reaching the length beyond which we never willingly suffer one to go, that we must of necessity cease our enumeration of the reasons, which in our opinion reader it as much the duty of our executive committee to prepare for the contest in this year, as it was in the year when we went through our fiercest trial. The township committees must see that the voters are registered, and that ballots are at the polling places ready to be put in the boxes; and that they are put in. The county committees must see that the township committees do their duty and must assist them in it. The day of election is too close for a single moment to be wasted. We do not think that there is any danger of our defeat, but popular elections are things of which no man can predict the result and if we are beaten by our own laches it will be poor consolation to think that it is our own fault.

TOTAL ABSTINENCE SAVING WINE TILL IT RIPPEN.

There is a curious story about some active wines which are extensively advertised nowadays, and have of late been put upon the market. Dr. Underhill, the well-known grape-grower of Union Point, died in 1871.
