

THE CONIGLAND CASE.

The result of the suit by the administrator of the late Edward Conigland against the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad, which was tried at the last term of Northampton Superior Court, seems to have excited unusual comment by a portion of the press of the State.

We noticed a few days ago that the Farmer and Mechanic denounced it as "outrageously unjust," and we clip the following as indicative of the sentiments of the Asheville Citizen—and Charlotte Observer:

The administrators of the late Hor. Edward Conigland, of Halifax County, sued the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad for damages, the deceased being run over and killed by a train on that road some eighteen months ago. He was quite deaf, and did not hear the train. The case has just been tried in Northampton county, and the jury has awarded the plaintiffs \$15,000 damages. The Charlotte Observer, commenting upon the action of the jury says:

"This is nothing short of an intolerable outrage. Mr. Conigland was upon the company's right of way and like every other deaf man he took his life in his hand when he stepped upon it. Law or no law the principle which awards a verdict for a plaintiff in such an action is all wrong. Such a verdict would not have been thought of in an action between individuals and such verdicts bring the American jury system into still greater contempt than has heretofore belonged to it. To say that \$15,000 is no more than a fair compensation to Mr. Conigland's family for the loss which they have sustained, is an argument which does not at all touch the merits of the case. The worth of such a man as Mr. Conigland to his family and to the State cannot be estimated by dollars and cents, but even if it could there are questions of equity arising which are entitled to decent respect and which should be adjusted in the hands of the law-maker, court and jury, before a defendant is allowed to be molested."

Why such comments should follow this verdict we cannot say, unless it be that the editors write about matters of which they know nothing, or are misled by the friends of the Railroad, who seek to create a false sentiment in their favor—but whatever the cause, we think the press should leave the case with the courts, whose duty it is to decide it; and who, we may safely assume, will treat it with as "decent respect" as it is entitled to. For the information of our contemporaries, we would say that the case was tried by an able Judge, an impartial jury, and by eminent counsel. To those, even, who were not at all interested in the cause, the testimony showed gross and wanton—almost cruel negligence on the part of the Company—and that by the most ordinary prudence, and care on its part, the fearful disaster could have been prevented. It was proved that the engineer saw Mr. Conigland 350 yards before he reached him; that he knew who he was and that he also knew he was deaf; that Conigland could not hear the ringing of the train 50 yards behind him, but could hear the whistle that distance; that the engineer made no attempt to stop, nor give him any warning of his approach by blowing the whistle or otherwise—and that if he had done so after he recognized Conigland, he could have escaped from the track; and that all this occurred at a time when the train was not expected at that place, three quarters of an hour later.

That the jury were justified in these findings is apparent to all who heard the testimony, and know the character of the witnesses for and against the Company; and for the further reason that the Judge though requested so to do refused to disturb them.

The Judge did, however, with the consent of the plaintiff, reduce the damages to 10,000. Upon these facts, we submit that at least "decent respect" has been paid to the equities of the case. If upon these facts, the Judge and jury are subject to such censures, then it will be hard to find a case in which they will be blamed. While writing, we are reminded of a case tried the same week in the adjoining county of Greensville Va., where the jury gave \$10,000 damages against the R & O. R. for breaking a boys leg. Is it that the courts and juries are all corrupt, or is it that Railroads are becoming too careless of human rights? Shall these corporations be our masters or our servants?

We protest, in behalf of the learned and impartial Judge, and the honest intelligent jury who tried the cause, these sweeping denunciations of them shall cease; unless, as suggested "law or no law" we must submit to the wanton and cruel conduct of irresponsible Railroad officials.

PUBLIC ROADS.

A BILL ENTITLED "AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR KEEPING IN REPAIR THE PUBLIC ROADS OF THE STATE."

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. That the Justices of the Peace in each and every township shall have the supervision and control of the public roads in their respective townships. They shall, with respect to this work, constitute and be styled the "Board of Supervisors of Public Roads" of such township. They are hereby incorporated, and the above shall be their corporate name.

Sec. 2. The said board of supervisors shall meet at some place in their respective townships, to be agreed upon by themselves, or in the absence of such agreement, to be named by their chairman, on the first Monday of February, May, August and November, for the purpose of consulting on the subject of the condition of the roads in their township. They shall some time during the week preceding each meeting, go over and personally examine all the roads in their township. They shall annually at their meeting in February, elect some one of their number chairman: Provided, that the first election for chairman shall be held on the first Monday in May, 1879 and the chairman then elected shall hold the position until the first Monday of February, 1880.

Sec. 3. The said board of supervisors shall annually, at the meeting in May, divide the roads of their township into sections, and appoint overseers for said sections at said meetings. They shall at the same time allot the hands to said overseers and shall also designate the boundaries or [points] to which each resident shall be liable to work on said section, and shall, within five days after such meeting, certify to each overseer written notice of his appointment, with a list of the hands assigned to his section: Provided, that the board of supervisors may at any time after the sections or allotment, but shall give notice thereof to the overseer. The overseer may resign after the expiration of twelve months, provided his road shall be in good repair and the board of supervisors shall so find; and any overseer so resigning, and whose resignation has been accepted by the board, shall not without his consent be again appointed overseer until after the expiration of two years from the date of his resignation. That when a public road shall be a dividing line between townships the board of commissioners of the county shall determine as to how said road shall be divided, with notice as to the working of said road.

Sec. 4. All able-bodied male persons between the ages of eighteen years and forty-five years shall be required under provisions of this act to work on the public roads, except the members of the board of supervisors of public roads, not less than 3 days in each and every year.

Sec. 5. The overseer of the road shall at least 3 days in the year summon the hands of his section to work on the road. The notice shall be at least two days before the day named for the work, shall state the hour and the place for the meeting of the hands, and what implement the hand shall bring with him. Every person liable to work on the road who has been so summoned shall appear at the time and place named, and with the implement directed, and shall work on the road under the direction of the overseer until discharged by him: Provided, that no hand shall be required to work for a longer time than seven hours nor for a longer time than ten hours in any one day. Any person summoned as aforesaid who shall by twelve o'clock of the day preceding the one appointed for work on the road pay to the overseer the sum of one dollar shall be relieved from working on the road for one day. The money thus collected by the overseer shall be by him applied on the working and repairing of the road: Provided, that any person who shall furnish one able-bodied hand as a substitute, with the implement directed, shall be held to have complied with the provisions of this act.

Sec. 6. Any person liable to work on the road who shall fail to attend and work as hereinbefore provided when summoned so to do, unless he shall have paid the one dollar as aforesaid, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction shall be fined not less than two dollars nor more than five dollars, or imprisoned not exceeding five days, or both, in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 7. Every overseer shall at each and every meeting of the board of supervisors of his township make report to them of the present condition of his road, of the number of days worked on his section since last meeting, of the number of hands who attended and worked each day, of the number and names of hands who failed to attend and work; whether or not they paid the one dollar as provided. That the said overseer shall before some person authorized to administer an oath make written affidavit that the report is true and correct. That upon this report sworn to as aforesaid, if it shall appear that any of the hands, after being legally summoned, have failed to attend and work on said road, and that they did not pay the one dollar, then it shall be the duty of the said justice of the peace, or any one of them, to issue a warrant for the arrest of any such hand or hands, and shall put him or them upon trial for the offence.

Sec. 8. The said overseers shall at the meeting of the supervisors in February make a report of all moneys collected by them from parties excused from work on the road for the preceding year, with a statement as to how the same was expended. That if any overseer shall fail to discharge any one of the duties imposed by this act he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction shall be fined seven dollars, and in default of payment of fine and cost be imprisoned not exceeding

five days. In case of failure of any overseer to make any report to the board of supervisors of public roads of his township, as provided in this act, then and in that case it shall be the duty of the chairman of such board immediately upon such failure to make a sworn statement of the fact before some justice of the peace of an adjoining township, who shall immediately issue his warrant for the arrest of the said overseer, and proceed to try him for the offence.

Sec. 9. The board of supervisors shall have the right to lay out and discontinue cartways, subject to all the rules and regulations now in force, and the board of commissioners of the county only shall have the right to lay out and establish and discontinue public roads, subject to the same rules and regulations now in force: Provided, however, that in laying out and establishing roads and cartways and for the purpose of assessing damage to property by reason of the same, no greater number of jurors than five shall be summoned or be required, any provision in any other law to the contrary notwithstanding.

Sec. 10. The board of supervisors shall annually make report to the first term of the superior court of their county after the first Monday in August of the condition of the roads of their township, and if the meetings provided for in this act have been held for said board, and the judge holding such term of the superior court shall after his charge to the grand jury and before they shall retire to their room call upon the clerk of the court for such reports, and they shall then and there be delivered to the foreman of the grand jury; and if any board of supervisors shall fail to make said report or to discharge any other duty imposed by this act, they shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be fined or imprisoned, or both, in the discretion of the court, and the indictments may be either against the board of supervisors, or against the individuals comprising it as justices of the peace.

Sec. 11. The several superior court clerks and the register of deeds in the state shall within twenty days after the passage of this act post a copy thereof in some conspicuous place in their respective offices, and to carry out this provision the secretary of state, immediately upon the ratification of this act, shall cause to be published in convenient form for this purpose a sufficient number of copies of this act, and he shall mail one copy to each and every superior court clerk and register of deeds in the state: Provided that the provisions of this act shall not apply to the counties of Alleghany, Ashe, Alexander, Watauga and Mecklenburg.

Sec. 12. All laws and clauses of laws in conflict with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 13. This act shall be in force from and after its ratification.
