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Roussiers, collector of the post of New York, was a strong half-breed and led the opposition against the reelection of the State Senators Conkling and Platt.

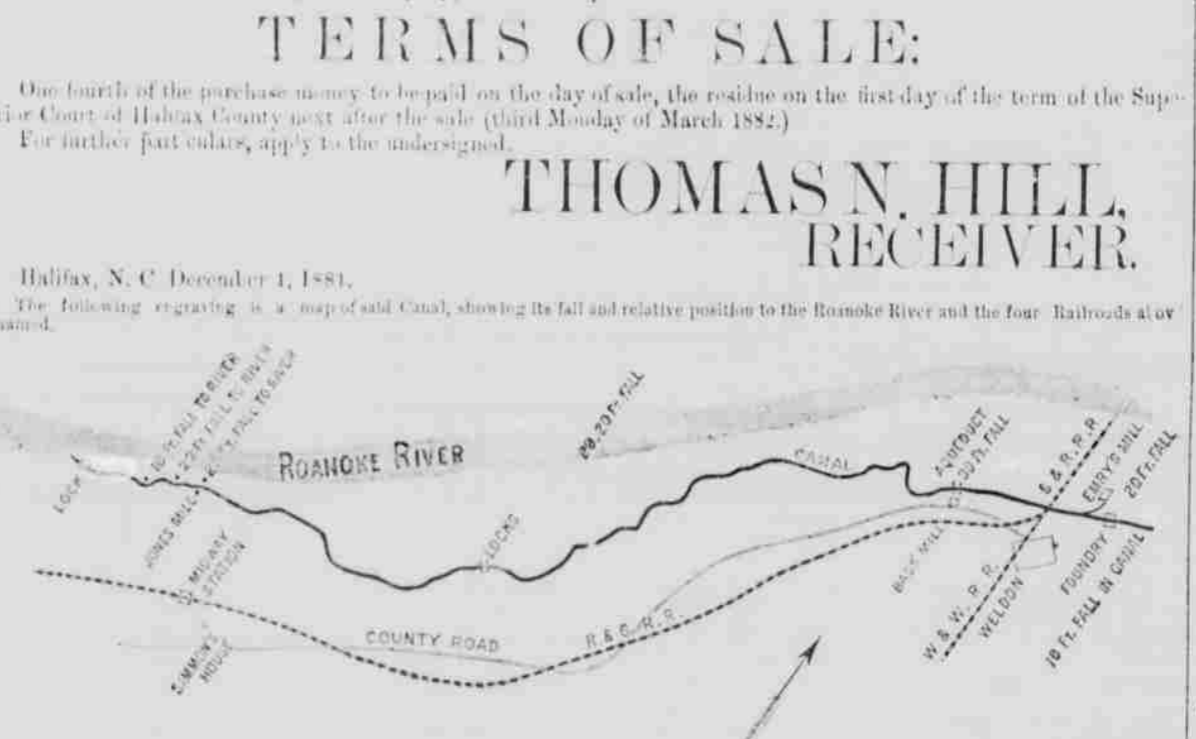
With our farmers plant as much cotton this year as last, and as little corn? and will they pay as little attention to stock? We hope not.
