The first intimation that the family had of the horrible deed was about I o'clock this mornhorrible deed was about I o'clock this morn-low, when Mrs. Borst discovered that her hus band was missing from bed, and search was at once instituted for his whereabouts. The feel-ings of his wife and children on finding him almost at death's door, and under such circum stances, can better be imagined than des-cribed. Or.
