DIRECT TAX LAW.

THE GOVERNOR TO PROCURE CERTIFIED COPIES OF THE TAX LIST AND NOTI-FY PERSONS OF THE AMOUNT DUE

The following is a copy of the act passed by the General Assembly in relation to the Direct Tax Law:

The General Assembly of North Carolina do Enact:

Sec. 1. That the money paid into the Treasury of the State by the Governor under the terms of the Act of Congress refunding the Direct Tax, shall be held in trust for the benefit of those persons or inhabitants from whom the taxes were collected, or their legal representatives, as provided in said of Congress.

Sec. 2. That the money received by the Governor as aforesaid shall be re-invested by him in North Carolina 4 per cent. bonds, and all the expenses of carrying into effect provisions of the act shall be defrayed out of the interest accruing upon said bonds.

Sec. 3. That it shall be the duty of the Governor to procure from the proper department at Washington certified copies of the tax lists and other evidence of payment of the direct taxes to the United States by persons or inhabitants of North Carolina, and to notify such persons or inhabitants, or their legal representatives, of the amount due them under this act. The Governor shall, as far provide for the repayment of the direct taxes to the persons entitled thereto, and not to an agent or attorney. All claims under the trust shall be alled with the Governor, together with proper proof of the qualification of any executer or ad ministrator, where the person from whom the tax was collected is dead. Upon proper proof the Governor shall draw his warrant in favor of the person entitled, and the same shall be paid by the Treas-

Sec. 4. No agent or attorney shall demand, collect, or receive more than five per centum commission upon the amount collected, as compensation for any service rendered to any claimant for any collection under this act; and any person viclating this section chall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Sec. 5. That all claims under the trust created by the act of Congress above mentioned shall be filed with the Governor within six years next after the approval of said act on March 2nd, 1891; and all claims not so filed shall be forever barred. And all moneys remaining in the Treasury arising from said fund at the expiration of the six years, shall be covered into the Treasury as the property of the State.

This act shall be in force from and after its ratification

THE SO-CALLED NEGRO PROBLEM-NOT HOLHING HIS OWN IN POPULATION.

The census figures have just destroyed an old and tenacious notion regarding the numerical status of the negro in the agcounties - Camden, Caswell, Duplin, gregate population of the country. A hundred es ago the black man, broadly, speaknumbered about one in five of the abitants of the country, while to-day loes not reach one in eight.

The social philosophers who have been ing for a great negro wave of popuon to overwhelm ultimately the white in this country, will see that no enragement for this idea can be obtained he census reports. Already some of m are beginning to take the opposite 20,829 view, and to predict the negro's speedy 14,254 extinction. He will disappear, they say, 8,897 as the Indian is disappearing, and wil leave behind him no trace of his existence. This judgment finds as little warrant in the facts of the case as the other. While the negro is decreasing in proportion to the aggregate population, he is increasing numerically. There are more black men in the country now than there were ten years ago, and there will be more ten years hence than there are now. Still the question as to whether he will eventually disappear altogether holds a subordinate place in practical politics. The main consideration with statesmen and economists is that in the general expansion in population he is not holding his own. He is steadily and rapidly falling behind in the race with his white neighbors. As a force in legislation his influence is waning. The black bogy which a few fanciful persons in the South and 34,175 North had conjured up is destroyed ef-9.435 fectually and permanently. Practically speaking, the negro problem is a thing of yesterday.

PLANT FOOD CROPS.

INCREASING DEMAND FOR THEM.

The continuous rainfall from December to March has prevented the farmers of most of the cotton belt from preparing their land for either corn or cotton. In a resume of the situation in the Gulf States and Mississippi delta, the Atlanta Constitution concludes that the coming cotton crop may be much shorter than last year's. Mr. S. M. Inman, of Atlanta, of the great cotton firm of Inman, Swann & Co., estimates the falling off in the total crop the coming season on account of a wet spring at 500,000 bales. In his interview, as given in the Constitution Mr. Inman says the cotton crop of 1890 was 1,000,000 bales larger than the increase in each race touched that of 1889, and 1,250,000 bales greater what higher figures, but the tendency than two years ago. It is too early to forecast the possibilities with reasonable accuracy, but should the rains continue a few weeks longer there will be little question of a smaller acreage, a shorter crop and higher prices.

While the cotton crop of last year was greater by 500,000 to 1,000,000 bales, the corn crop of the United States was short 500,000,000 bushels. The consumption of this grain never diminishes, but is largely increased annually. Even should the next crop be very large, corn will probably rule high on account of the great shortage of 1890, and should there again be a small crop, prices would be higher than for many years. The daily increase of the South's population in consumers not engaged in agriculture has already had a very perceptible effect in increasing the demand for all kinds of food. For whatever the farms and gardens can supply there is a market. With the prospects for cotton what they are and the outlook indicating high prices for corn, it will be true economic wisdom, for every Southern farmer to try to raise this year a surplus of food products beyond his own needs. Every Southern planter should raise his own corn this year. With a big corn crop and with high prices for a moderate cotton crop, Southern farmers would be in excellent financial shape next winter.-Manufacturer's Record.
