## DIRECT TAX LAW.

The following is a copy of the act assed by the Gencrial Assembly in rela ion to the Direct Tax Law:
The Geaeral Assembly of North Caro-
Liua de Einct:
Sec. 1 . That the money paid int The Treasury of the State by the Gove Lor under the terms of the Aet of Con
gress refunding the Direct Tax, shall b held in trust for the benefit of those per
sons or inlabitants from whom the taxes were collected, or their legal represent ives, as provided in ssid of Coggress.
Sce. 2. That the money received the Governor as atoresid shall be re in vested by him in North Carolina $4 p$ sing into effect provisions of the a hall be defrayed out of the interest uing upon said bonds. Gevernor to sroal be the duty r department at Washington certifed of payment of the direct taxes to the United States by percons or inhabitants of North Carolina, and to notify such rosentatives, of the amount due them unrovide for the repayment of the dirent Wist to the pervons eutitled thereto, and under the trust shall be filed with the
Governer, together with proper prouf of the quatification of any executer or addthe tax was cullheted is dead. Upon proper prour fhe fuvertur shall araw his
warrant in favor of the person entiled and the same shall be paid by the Treasurer of the State.
Sec. 4. No agent or attorney shall demand, collect, or receive more than five per centum commiseion upon the amount
collected, as compensation for any service rendered to any chamant for any collec-
tion under this act; and any person vic tion under this aet; and any person vic
lating this section chall be guily of misdemeanor.
Sec. 5. That all chaims under the rust created by the act of Congress above mentioned shall be filed with the Gover nor within six yeurs next after the ap-
proval of suid aet on March 2nd, 1891; and all claims not so flled shall be forevor barred. And all moneys remaining in the Treasury arising from said fund at the expiration of the six years, shal be covered into the

The continuous riuffall from DecemIf March has prevented the farmers of wost of the cotton belt from preparing
their ludd for either cern or cotton. In a resume of the situation in the Gulf States and Mississippi delta, the Atlanta Constitution concludes that the coming cotton crop may be much shorter than
last year's. Mr. S. M. Inman, of Atlanta, of the great cotton firm of Inman, Swann \& Co., estimates the falling off in Swann d Co., estimates the faling of ac-
the total crop the coming season on account of a wet spring at 500,000 bales. In bis ioterview, as given in the ConstituCion Mr. Inman says the cotton crop of 1890 was $1,000,000$ bales larger than
hat of 1889 , and $1,250,000$ bales greater that of 1889 , and $1,250,000$ bales greater
thans ago. The annual increase of the world's consumption is about 400 ,000 bales at present. Last year was phenomenal season for the entire cotton belt. The crop of 1889-90 was none too large for the world's needs and prices ruled high, but the last crop was too large by half a million bales; bence the resent low prices. Should the crop this year fall short half a miliion bales of that of last saason, there would be a considerto forecast the possibilities with reasonable accuracy, but should the rains continuc
a few weeks longer there will be little question of a smuller acreage, a shorter crop and higher prices.
While the cotton crop of last year was greater by 500,000 to $1,000,000$ bales, the corn crop of the United States was short $500,000,000$ buskels. The consumption of this grain never diminishes,
but is largely increased annually. Even should the next crop be very large, corn will probably rule high on account of the great shortage of 1890 , and should there again be a small crop, prices would be
higher than for many years. The daily higher than for many years. The daily
