The head was considerably bruised showing conclusively that he had been clubbed to death. Mr. Taylor was a quiet, inoffersive man and no one can account for the murder except that he was supposed to carry with him more or less money and it is thought that he was killed for his money and his body put in the creek to conceal the crime. Mr. Taylor leaves a family. The coroner's jury returned a verdict in accordance with the fact and implicating two negroes who were arrested and taken before a magistrate. Upon examination they could not be connected with the crime and were discharged


