

STATE NEWS.

A man died in Morganton last at the age of 103 years.

The new passenger depot at Fayetteville is to cost \$78,000.

A boy fourteen years old was kicked to death in Franklin county last week.

Two Mormon elders are propagating their peculiar doctrines in Davidson county.

The work of the geological survey is now concentrated in the Western part of the State.

The Herald says the Third party in Johnston county is growing less and less every day.

The State Pharmaceutical Association will hold its annual session at Raleigh on August 10th and 11th.

The maypop which grows spontaneously in this State is now shipped to the Northern cities for the table.

Reports from the Eastern portion of the State are to the effect that the rains have injured the crops.

The New South Development company has been incorporated at Rocky Mount with a capital of \$15,000.

Salisbury has contracted for a complete system of sewerage, and Chapel Hill is arranging for water works.

There are seventy railroads in the State and their total length is 3,548 miles—a gain of fifty per cent. in nine years.

Thus far 116 complaints have been filed in the railroad commission office since its organization in April of last year.

A canning company at Southport is now engaged in putting up clams. They have an order for 20,000 cans to be filled in August and September.

The Winston water company will expend \$76,000 for additional water supply, putting in another pump with a capacity of 1,500,000 gallons daily.

The buildings for the Presbyterian Orphan Asylum at Barium Springs are now ready for the roof and will be completed by September. This is the fifth institution of the kind to be established in the State.

A fire occurred at Alma, on the Carolina Central road, Thursday, destroying saw and planing mills, lumber, two box cars and other property. The loss is \$17,000, which was covered by insurance.

The remains of Chapman Gordon, who died and was buried near Wilkesboro seventy seven years ago, were exhumed a few days ago and placed in a grave over which the new Presbyterian church will stand. There was nothing found in the grave except bones, which were in a perfect state of preservation. Mr. Gordon was the grandfather of Gen. John B. Gordon, of Georgia.

There will be a meeting at Morehead City on August 10, of representatives of various chambers of commerce and other business organizations at which the questions of literature to be distributed at the World's Fair, permanent exhibition of the State's resources, establishment of a bureau of information, taxation (especially the merchants purchase tax) etc., will be discussed.

A movement is on foot for the erection of a large hotel on the surf side of Bogue banks at Morehead. It is proposed to raise \$150,000 for the hotel and outlying improvements and to have it ready for guests with the beginning of the next season. It is proposed also to connect the banks with Morehead, across the sound, either by an electric railway or a steam ferry. There is a smooth beach twenty-five miles long and the surf will be within a few yards of the hotel. The beach will be lighted with electric lights.

Noah Gibbs, a white man of weak intellect, was found on the streets of Washington a few days ago and put in the lockup. After spending the night there he was found the next morning in an insensible condition. Medical aid restored him to consciousness, but he died in a few hours afterward. An autopsy showed that he had died from paralysis of the heart, superinduced by whisky, and a verdict returned by the coroner's jury accordingly. The whisky was given the imbecile "for fun."
