

(he sesame pope in 1572) that difference of but eleven minutes each year had grown to an error of ten whole days. To obviate this error, Gregory ordained, in 1582, that that year should consist of but 365 days; this change was called the change from the Julian to the Gregorian system of reckoning time. However, all the world, with the exception of Italy and a few inconsiderable countries, reckoned time by the old Julian style for more than a hundred years after Gregory had announced the change. England the Gregorian system was not recognized until 1752, at which time another whole day of error had been limits of added. In the year last mentioned above England and her dependencies, America included, made the change September 3 of that year, being reckoned as the fourteenth. Russia is the only country of any importance that still adheres to the old style system. Chicago Herald.

THE SUN RECORD.

tow the Duration of Sunshine Is Accu-rately tianged.

Sunshine is recorded at the Meteorological office in England by means of the Stokes-Campbell instrument, the ssential feature of which is a spherical lens, which acts as a burning glass. As the sun accomplishes its apparent journey from east to west, it burns its autograph into a strip of card placed beneath the lens, but can only do so when it is anobscured. As the card is divided nto hours, it is easy to calculate the amount of actual sunshine with which each day is favored. A report has recently been issued giving the results achieved by this in-strument for the past ten years. From this we learn that our southern coasts are the most sunny ones, if we except the Channel islands, as represented by Jersey, where alone one-half the possible amount of radiance was registered for May and August. The east coast of Britain is also decidedly sunny. In the summer and early autumn Ireland shares with the west coast of Scotland the reputation of persistently-clouded skies, but later on, toward November.


