

"John, wilt thou have this woman to be thy wedded wife?" "Why, sir," said the astonished groom


to the more astonished minister, "I told you we was married two years ago!"

Buttons and Combs Made of Blood. There is large factory at a small town near Chicago employing about 100 or 150 workers, which is wholly given over to the manufacture of useful articles from waste animal blood. At certain sensons of the year this unique factory uses from 10,000 to 15,000 gallons of fresh blood per day. It is first converted into thin sheets by evaporation and certain chemical processes, and afterward worked up into a variety of useful articles, such as combs, buttons, carrings, belt clasps, loweelets, etc. Tons of these articles are sent to all parts of the world every year from this "bloody" Sucker state manufactory.
