

N. C. CONFERENCE.

The 60th Annual Session of the North Carolina Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church South—The Appointments and Other Conference Notes.

The sixtieth annual session of the North Carolina Conference was called to order last week at Kinston by Bishop Alphus W. Wilson, of Baltimore.

The Conference was in session five days. Among the most important matters discussed by the Conference, outside of preaching the gospel, were State aid for the University, Dr. Kilge's resolution against five scholarships at Chapel Hill, and Rev. Dr. Cole's resolution touching the adoption of the North Carolina Christian Advocate as the organ of the North Carolina Conference.

Dr. Kilge won the fight by a substantial majority, though not without a division that makes it a barren victory.

The resolution was strongly opposed by L. I. Smith, of Gates, and Revs. Hall, Swiggell and Betts.

Dr. Kilge, Dr. Yates, and Rev. Mr. Oglesby spoke for the resolution. Several ministers, among them Dr. Yates and Dr. Cole, declared that the resolution was not in opposition to State aid, but in favor of it.

Rev. J. N. Cole, Chairman of Committee on Books and Periodicals, read report recommending the adoption of the Christian Advocate as the organ of the North Carolina Conference. The report was adopted. Rev. Mr. Cole also recommended the purchase of \$3,000 worth of stock in the Christian Advocate and recommended the election of Rev. T. N. Ivey as editor and Rev. W. L. Grissom as business manager. Adopted.

Raleigh was selected as the next place of meeting. A collection was taken up during the session for Rev. R. P. Troy, and \$105.00 was raised in cash.

Rev. R. P. Troy was placed on the superannuated list at his own request. Secretary Cunningham read the minutes of the closing session, after which the Bishop made appropriate remarks and then read the list of appointments.
