## ENFORCE THE LAW.

The attention of the citizens of our town is called to the present condition of anarchy in regard to the prohibition law. That there is open and flagrant violation, barefaced and continual, is patent to every observer, and this state of things is bringing ridicule and justly so not only upon our law but upon our citizenship. Formerly when we had seven bar-rooms including four negro places we enforced strict Sunday observance. Now liquor is in easy reach seven days per week and 24 hours per day. Yet the law says this shall not be and a law enacted by a sovereign State and entitled to as much respect as the statutes against murder and felonies. It is needless to lay all the blame for this shameful condition of affairs to the officers of the town. They have their share of the responsibility from which there is no escape. It makes no difference whether there is no effort for law enforcement by the town government or whether an honest vigilance is non-effective. The fact that the prohibition law in Weldon is null and void is on every tongue with no attempt at denial, and this in a town voting 228 to 9 for prohibition. Where is our regard for the majesty of the law as a principle, whether we be for or against legalized liquor selling. Where is our manhood that we are willing to submit to the domination of a venal minority, without even raising an outcry. What about our boasted civilization and enlightenment to say nothing of Christian integrity and influence. This is a vital question, men of Weldon, and calls for prompt solution. Please note that no person claiming respectability, white or black, is suspected of law violation. The ex-barkeepers, to their lasting credit, accept to a man in good faith the mandate of the law and no suspicion has been lodged against any of them. Vagrants and bums are setting at naught—openly and defiantly—a law of our proud State, enacted for the promotion of morals and the protection of women and children. This is subjecting us as a corporate body to contempt, expressions of which can be heard on every hand. It is now no longer a question of prohibition or anti-prohibition for liquor or against liquor, but a question of who rules this town, and whether respect for law shall be enforced. Who are responsible for this condition of affairs? Every thing wearing trousers and calling himself a man. Our Mayor is calling upon the people for help. The chief of police is holding out signals of distress. Evidence is difficult to secure and convictions uncertain under our present process of law. The situation is critical and demands the attention of all classes of men. Now what is the remedy? We respectfully suggest that a mass meeting be called to which all citizens are invited who believe in law enforcement. Through our question from the standpoint of common decency and respect for law, create a law and order league by banding together for the public good, and announce that this thing shall stop. Demand that the officers of the town take vigorous steps to punish offenders and let them know that you are behind them. Exercise every honorable means to secure evidence, enforce warrant laws against all those who have no visible means of support by sending them to the chain gang. Exercise the statute that allows unlicensed places to be searched. Visit the Express office and freight depots to ascertain who is receiving liquor in suspicious quantities. State positively to these people that this notorious business shall stop and the track will be turned. It has been said that Weldon does nothing in halves. We have given free rein to lawlessness, and if you get her men to see the condition in its true light and make up their minds to create a transformation, Sahara will be a blooming garden to the drough that will then prevail.

## THE OHIO VALLEY EXPOSITION.

To commemorate the Completion of the Lock and Dam in the Ohio River at Cincinnati, Ohio.

To commemorate the completion of the lock and dam in the Ohio river at Cincinnati, Ohio, thereby furnishing a harbor 25 miles long, there will be held at Cincinnati, Ohio, from August 29 to October 4th, 1910, the Ohio Valley Exposition.

Realizing the importance of the trade relations existing between cities of the Ohio valley and the Atlantic Coast states, the railroads of the South felt that this would afford an opportunity to present to the people of the middle west a collective display of the resources of the South. Representatives of more than thirty railroads met in Cincinnati on April 1st and decided that an exhibit should be representative of the South instead of making individual railroad displays as has been the custom heretofore.

The work of designing and assembling the exhibit has been placed in the hands of an executive committee composed of five railroad industrial agents representing the various sections of the South; and W. White, General Industrial Agent of the Southeast Air Line Railway at Norfolk, Va., and M. V. Richards, Land and Industrial Agent of the Southern Railway at Washington, D. C., designated as associate chairman, have been appointed to represent the Atlantic Coast States. Serving under Messrs. White and Richards are sub-committees located at various points throughout the South and the persons composing these committees are making every effort to secure material as well as enable a most creditable and comprehensive display to be made.

While this matter is being handled directly by the railroads, it is expected that commercial organizations of the various cities throughout the South will join in the movement. Indeed this seems a rare opportunity for each community to exploit its peculiar advantages without incurring any expense beyond that incident to assembling such exhibits as they may make.

The people of the South have already manifested such interest as will undoubtedly materially assist in making this affair one of great importance as they realize in that many benefits must follow from the contact and intercourse which such a display will bring about.
