HON. CLAUDE KITCHIN.

The South Carolina District Democracy again nominates for Congress Hon. Claude Kitchin, and in honoring him it selects a man who has been a working and a virile force for Democracy.

Mr. Kitchin has taken such a stand in Congress that there was no thought of an opponent. He is ever on the alert in his work to have the Democratic party stand out as the party of the people, with equal rights to all, special privileges to none.

The Second District has learned to know Claude Kitchin, and his endeavor has always been to keep Democracy in evidence. His experience in Congress makes it most probable that he should be again the nominee and in the full election the district will roll up a big majority for Mr. Kitchin. In his Congressional career he has always rung true to Democracy.

In the session of Congress recently ended about thirty-seven thousand bills were introduced. Out of these between 3 and 4 hundred were passed and became laws. Among the bills which became laws, the most important are these:

- Revising the railroad laws and creating an interstate commerce court.
- Establishing a postal savings bank system.
- Admitting New Mexico and Arizona as States.
- Appropriating \$20,000,000 to complete reclamation projects.
- Creating a bureau of mines.
- Providing for the publicity of campaign contributions.
- Suppressing the white-slave traffic.
- Authorizing the President to withdraw from ceded public lands as he wishes for conservation.
- Appropriating \$250,000 for the use of the Tariff Board.

JUDICIAL CONVENTION.

Proceedings in Detail—Nominating Speeches and Election of Executive Committee.

At the hour of going to press last week, we stated that Judge R. B. Peebles, of Northampton, was nominated by acclamation for Judge of the Second Judicial District, and that Hon. J. H. Kerr, of Warren, had been nominated to succeed himself as solicitor of the district.

The convention was called to order at 12:30 by Chairman F. R. Harris, of Northampton county, and D. E. Stainback was elected temporary secretary. The temporary organization was made permanent. The roll call showed all the counties in the district represented except Bertie and Hertford. Later a telegram was received from the Chairman Democratic Executive Committee of Bertie requesting Chairman of the convention to cast Bertie's solid vote for Peebles and Kerr.

Nominations being in order, Elliott B. Clark, a young lawyer of Weldon who has recently been licensed to practice law, in well chosen words nominated Hon. R. B. Peebles, of Northampton county, for Judge of the 2nd Judicial District. Nomination seconded by J. A. Downin, of Warren, and Garland Midyette, of Northampton. There being no opposition the nomination was by a rising vote, which was unanimous.

W. H. S. Burgwyn, Jr., of Northampton, placed in nomination Hon. John H. Kerr, of Warren, for solicitor, seconded by T. O. Rodwell, of Warren, and G. C. Peebles, of Northampton. Mr. Kerr was also nominated by acclamation.

The Executive Committee for the district was then named as follows:

- Bertie—J. B. Stokes.
- Halifax—George C. Green.
- Hertford—John E. Vann.
- Northampton—F. R. Harris.
- Warren—S. G. Daniel.


