

REV. P. N. STAINBACK

Answers Last Roll Call—A Good Man Goes To His Reward—Brief Sketch of His Life.



PETER NATHANIEL STAINBACK, who by mistake took a deadly poison Tuesday, the 13th, died at his home on Elm street Monday morning, at 8 o'clock, after six days of intense suffering.

Mr. Stainback was born in Brunswick county, Va., October 7, 1841, and was the eldest child of William R. and Mary C. Stainback, his mother being a daughter of the late Nathaniel Mason, of that county.

He came to Weldon in 1881, and since that time he has been closely identified with the affairs of the town, having served on the Board of Aldermen for quite a number of years, resigning November 1st, at which time he was elected a representative in the House of the next General Assembly from Halifax county, and he had been looking forward with much pleasure to the coming session.

Mr. Stainback entered the war between the States at the age of 19 and served for four long years with conspicuous bravery. He entered as a private in Company B, Brunswick Blues, and was first lieutenant of his company when he surrendered at Appomattox Court House, April 9th, 1865.

He is survived by a wife and nine children and a large number of grandchildren and two great grandchildren, all of whom were here at the time of his death. He also leaves two sons and four brothers.

Born and reared in the Methodist Episcopal Church Mr. Stainback identified himself with that church here and he rendered valuable and acceptable service ever since. August 22, 1887, he was licensed a local preacher. Since then he has held most acceptably the pulpit of his own and many other churches. He was a quick and ready speaker, with an inexhaustible fund of striking illustrations, and was never dull or tiresome. Loving next to his family and his church, the "Lost Cause" which he served so well, it was ever his delight to attend the reunions of the "Blue Gray Line," and he was much sought after as a speaker for these occasions, often going to distant points to meet former friends and comrades.

At the organization of the Weldon Graded School, he was appointed one of the trustees on the board, which office he has since held giving valuable aid in all school work. Mr. Stainback was also a trustee of the Methodist Episcopal Church and a member of the congregation took greater pride and interest in the building of the handsome new structure, a building he was never to enter alone after its completion. Mr. Stainback was of a bright and happy disposition, and was a man of big heart, kindly nature, living, cheerful in the brotherhood of man, and was ready in giving aid and assistance of all in distress.

The funeral service took place yesterday afternoon at half past one o'clock from the new Methodist Episcopal Church, which had been temporarily furnished for the occasion.

There was a profound and touching observance during the service in various sections, the design being among the handsomest ever seen here, and the casket was borne high with stately reminders of the high esteem in which Rev. Mr. Stainback was held.

The honorary pall bearers were members of the Graded School board as follows: W. T. Daniel, J. A. Musgrave, G. W. Fulgham, Mayor W. W. Wiggins, J. L. Shepherd, Dr. J. F. Green, Dr. W. J. Ward, A. S. Allen.

The active pall bearers were members of the town board of Christian missions—W. M. Cohen, R. T. Daniel, W. T. Shaw, W. T. Scott, J. W. Pierce, H. L. Grant and A. E. Wilson.

The funeral was most impressive, there being quite a number of ministers present. Rev. S. E. Mercer, pastor of the church, was assisted in the service by ministers of other Weldon churches and by visiting ministers from various churches in the district. The interment was in Cedarwood cemetery.

Blessed, comforting thoughts. Death for him had no terrors. His lamp was trimmed and burning and he has entered into the upper sanctuary to enjoy the fullness of life beyond, where all is joy and peace.
