New York, June 25.—The big gamblers' failure in the United States was precipitated today when receivers were appointed for the B. B. Claflin Company, of this city. The company, it is estimated, owes more than \$30,000,000, which at the present time is unable to pay. Its assets are said to be \$44,000,000.

The crash came after vain efforts had been made by Mr. Claflin to induce J. P. Morgan & Company and other Wall street banking interests to loan him money to tide over his embarrassment. These bankers, it was learned, advanced the company several million dollars about two weeks ago, but banks continued to press their claims until it became evident that actually the whole \$30,000,000 would have to be raised to save the company from failing.


