It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to buy or sell any eigars, eigarettes, tobacco, soft drinks or any other goods, wares or metulan-disc of any kind whatsoever on Sunday drugs and ice alone excepted; or to open my store or shop on Sanday in which same are kept, for the purpose of selling same, any person, firm or corporation relating any of the provis-ions of this section, shall, upon convic-tion, be fixed \$20. Provided, that after conviction, and a judgment of said pen-atty, the mayor shall have power in his discretion to remit any portion, thereof

not exceeding \$15. GEORGE (, GREEN, Mayor.

Ordinance 100. It shall be unlawful for any person, arm or corporation to display on the dde walks in the town of Weldon any goods, or merchandise of any kind whatseever, and any person so offend-ing shall upon conviction be fined \$10. GEORGE C. GREEN, Mayor.

Ordinance 101. It shall be unlawful for any perso firm or corporation to allow any gate or door to open upon the street except screen doors to stores. Any person vio-lating this section shall upon conviction pay a fine of \$5. GEORGE C. GREEN, Mayor

Ordinance 102,

It shall be unlawful for any person to drive an automobile, motorcycle or other vehicle at a greater rate of speed than ten miles an hour in the business section of the Town of Weldon, or at a greater rate of speed than officen miles an hour in the residence section of said town, and any person violating the pro-visions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction, be fined \$50. Provided, up. on conviction and a judgment of sail penalty, the Mayor may in his discre-tion remit any portion thereof not exceeding the sum of \$45. GEORGE C. GREEN, Mayor.

Ordinance 103.

It shall be unlawful for any person of persons to have or use any surface tode or privy in the town of Weldon after September 1st, in the territory bounder as follows On north by canal and drain as follows: On north by canal and drain from old canal to town line, on East by Cedar street, on south by 9th street, on west by A. C. I., R. R. Co., except where sever and water are not now extended, and any person violating this section shall, upon conviction be fined \$30. Provided, after judgment the Mayor may in his discretion, remit any portion thereof not exceeding \$10.
