Early returns Tuesday night were favorable to Hughes' election, but Wednesday morning Chairman McCreck was showing Wilson's election with 270 electoral votes; 200 being necessary. At the time of going to press we can safely say Wilson is elected President.

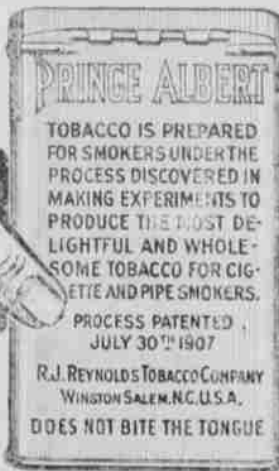


Congressman Claude Kitchin ran away from his opponent, W. O. Dixon. He carried every one of the eight counties by big majorities.
