FARM NOTES.

Interesting Items Furnished by Frank G. Tarbox, Jr., Emergency Demonstration Agent for Halifax County.

Just as soon as all the tobacco has been put into the barns, every stalk in the field should be destroyed by cutting them with stalk cutters or disc harrows and plowing them in. Stalks which are allowed to remain in the field furnish food for the diseases and insects which at times cause considerable loss.

As long as the stalks are alive the insects and diseases continue to increase, and this means that we are aiding rather than trying to kill out these pests. Some of the tobacco diseases live on certain weeds, and in spreading from the tobacco fields they find places to live over until another season.

The live over until another season. The worms continue to thrive until frost, and then hibernate until next season, and as long as we leave the stalks growing we are only helping these destructive pests to increase and be ready to attack the crop worse another year.

Mr. George Evans, Sheep Field Agent for North Carolina, spent two days in Halifax county some time ago. While here he visited several farmers who were interested in sheep. As a result of this visit several farmers were induced to get some in some good stock.

Among those who have either bought or have arranged with Mr. Evans to get sheep, are Charles Shields, W. M. Hancock, Frank Smith and Charles Lawrence. Mr. Shields was able with Mr. Evans' assistance to get twenty-five head of high grade ewes, and a pure-bred Shropshire buck.

Mr. Hancock arranged to get a good buck also. Mr. Frank Smith has arranged with Mr. Evans to get some real high-grade stock. While he will not get but a few, he has decided to get real good ones.

This will mean that those who are growing grade stock will be able to get good bucks for improving their stock at home. Mr. Shields has arranged to get the flock of sheep owned by Mr. J. B. Hunter, of Enfield.

Mr. Lawrence has bought a few head and will get some more as soon as he can locate them. Low grade sheep, like the average found in Eastern North Carolina, do not shear more than from three to five pounds of wool, while the high grade sheep shear from eight to twelve or over.

Realizing the value and need for good pastures Mr. A. S. Allen, of Weldon, is planning to sow two acres of mixed grass and clover pasture in September. He will also plant two acres of alfalfa. Every farmer who can possibly do so should have an acre or two of alfalfa.

Not only is it valuable on account of its feed value, but it will enable the farmer to produce at home the necessary hay for his stock. Alfalfa can be cut as many as five times a year.

On Tuesday of last week County Agent F. G. Tarbox left for Raleigh, taking with him four members of the Halifax County Pig Clubs to attend the Boys' Short Course at the A. & E. College.

Those who went from Halifax county are George Pittman, Halifax, Jas. and Edgar Laughter, Ringwood, and Clyde Madry, Scotland Neck. While in Raleigh these boys were given instruction in judging and feeding pigs. The morning hours were given to lectures, while the afternoons were devoted to play. On Wednesday afternoon all the boys were taken up town to see the interesting places in Raleigh. Baseball and other games were enjoyed by all, but the most attractive feature to all the boys was the swimming pool at the college. Y. M. C. A. This was such a drawing card that it was hard to keep the boys out, and at times doors had to be locked. All returned home safely on Saturday.

County Agency F. G. Tarbox returned to Raleigh Sunday to attend the meeting of the county agents and farmers convention. The agents meeting will extend through Wednesday of this week, and the farmers convention will be Thursday and Friday.

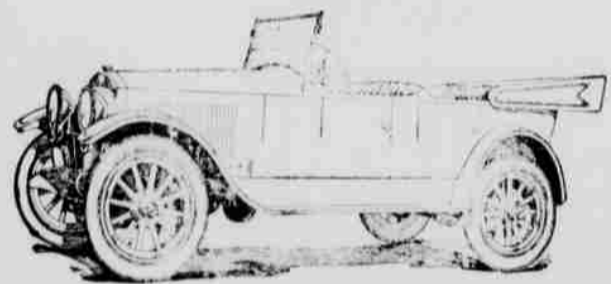
