How to BE RELEASED FROM Bores .- The Pal Mall Gazette says that among the many useful inventions of modern days, none deserves to rank higher than an ingenious little machine just invented by an American in Portsmouth, New Hampshire. It is called "The Business-man's Bore-abater," and its action is simple and effectual. It consists of a button torpedo, with patent nitro-glycerine backaction attachment, that can be worn on the coat like an ordinary button, which, indeed, it resembles in appearance. it instantly explodes, shivering his hand into a million pieces, and blowing him around the corner into the next street. The inventor, it is stated, has already received orders for all he can manufacture for two years to come. A machine on the same principle, so constructed as to present the appearance of a doorhandle, would be very useful to Ministers of State when about to receive deputation, and for domestic purposes, such as receiving applicants for charitable donations, rate collectors, and others visitors of this description. A householder's bore-abater," fixed on the front door, would be an immense success.

The highest inhabited spot in the world is the Buddhist cloister of Hanle in Thibet, where twentyone priests lived at an altitude of 16,500 feet.
