The Weather.

If these old saws be true we stand an excellent chance for having full crops and empty cemeteries next year.

The Return Home.
The Wilmington Light Infantry and the Cornet Concert Club returned home last evening from their inaugural visit to Charlotte and Raleigh. They were met at the depot by the Cape Fear Light Artillery and escorted to the Army on South Front street where over a glass of punch and a good cigar they narrated some of their peculiar experiences. They speak in the highest terms of the reception in Charlotte where everything possible was done to make their short stay as pleasant and agreeable as it could possibly have been. The road from Charlotte to Raleigh, with Governor Vance on board and under escort, was one continued ovation all the way. In Raleigh it was cold and snowy, so much so, in fact, that everything was snowed up, even including the Raleigh military, or at least this was the conclusion our boys have arrived at in consequence of having seen so little of the Raleigh gray jackets. But few of them saw the inauguration ceremonies, which took place in Tucker Hall, but nevertheless they had a good time in their own way, but they had to look it up. In Charlotte they were received by the Mayor, the military and prominent citizens with every manifestation of pleasure and hospitality and were entertained at the expense of the city and in Raleigh they were received with well, in Raleigh they were entertained at their own expense. They arrived at Goldsboro early yesterday morning, and in consequence of the snow blockade on trains further North were compelled to remain there until 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Again left to their own resources for amusement they did not hesitate to improve the shining hours as the used-up appearance of some of them this morning will testify. The parade of the Mulligan Guards, recruited from among the company, was the most prominent and amusing feature of the day and this was followed by a stag dance which was kept up until the arrival of the train which was to bear them homeward.
