Office of City Clerk & Treasurer, CITY OF WILMINGTON, JANUARY 30th, 1877.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD of Aldermen of the City of Wilmington, N. C., as follows: Section 1st. That Fortune Tellers shall pay a License Tax of Fifty Dollars per week. Any person or persons who tell Fortunes shall be liable to this Tax.

Section 2d. And any such person who tells Fortunes in this City, without first obtaining a City License therefor, shall be fined Fifty Dollars, (\$50) for every day he or she carries on said business without City License.

The above Ordinance was passed by the Board of Aldermen, January 30th, 1877. T. C. SERVOSS, City Clerk and Treasurer.
