The Insane Asylum-The New Directors Appointed. The readers of the News will remember that its issue of last Thursday contained interesting rumors in regard to vacancies said to exist at present in the old or Brogden Board of Directors of the Insane Asylum.

It turns out that the rumors published in that connection are true as to all material points. That is to say, of the fifteen directors now supposed to be in charge of the asylum, only five are, in point of fact, legally directors, the terms of nine having expired by limitation and by failure of the Senate of the last General Assembly to confirm them, and one having resigned within the past week.

The five who "hold over" are: Dr. B. F. Arrington, of Wayne, Rev. G. W. Welker, of Guilford, and Dr. E. Burke Haywood and Messrs. J. M. Pool and Anderson Betts of Wake.

Under this state of facts it devolved upon His Excellency, the Governor, to fill these ten vacancies by appointment, and yesterday he did this by the re-appointment of the gentlemen whom he named about the 5th of March as his new board of directors under the act of the last Legislature, viz: J. S. Amis vice Gen. W. D. Jones, not confirmed; Dr. J. T. Leach, vice Chas. H. Thomas, term expired; Maj. C. Dowd, vice J. R. Hardin, term expired; Col. J. G. Burr, vice G. W. Stanton, term expired; Col. Geo. D. Green, vice W. H. Myers, term expired; Rev. B. Craven, vice N. G. Coffin, term expired; S. G. Ward, vice Jas. T. Pearson, not confirmed.

firmed; A. M. McPheeters, vice John R. Good, not confirmed; M. L. Neilson vice Dr. J. G. Ramsay, not confirmed; and in addition to these Julius Lewis vice F. H. Cameron, resigned. The new board therefore consists of the ten gentlemen just named as appointees to these vacancies, and the five of the old board mentioned above, viz: Messrs. B. F. Arrington, G. W. Welker, E. Burke Haywood, J. M. Pool and Anderson Betts.

There are upon this new board, which will take possession at once, 13 Democrats and 2 Republicans, and it is no secret at all that the complexion of the board is unmistakably anti-Grissom.

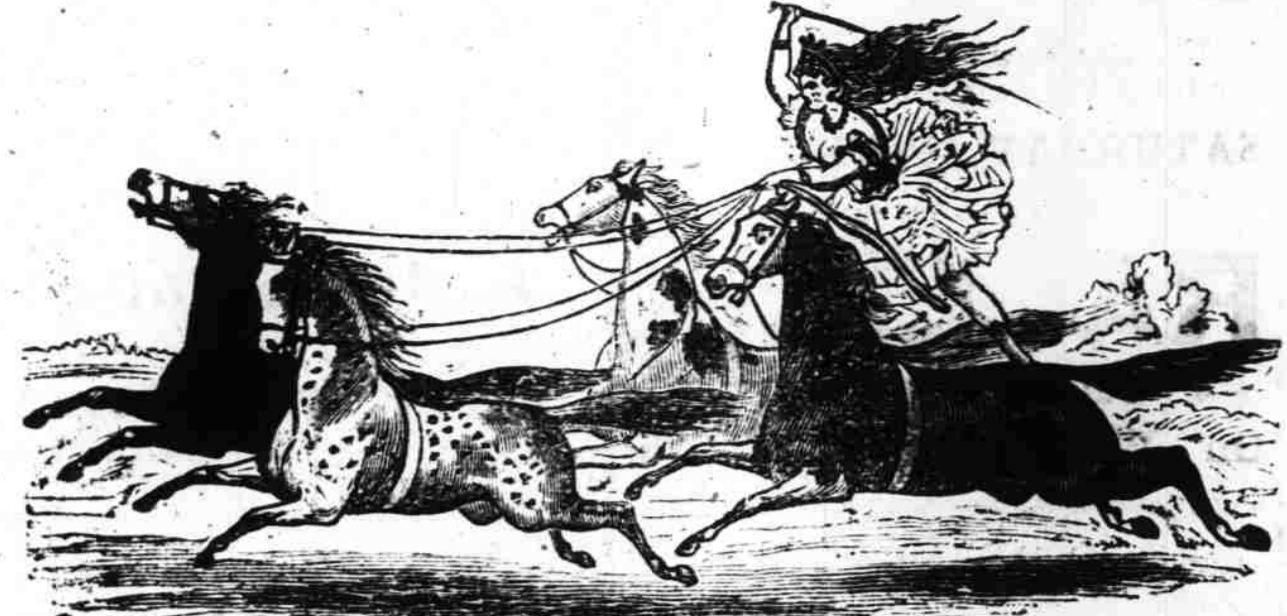

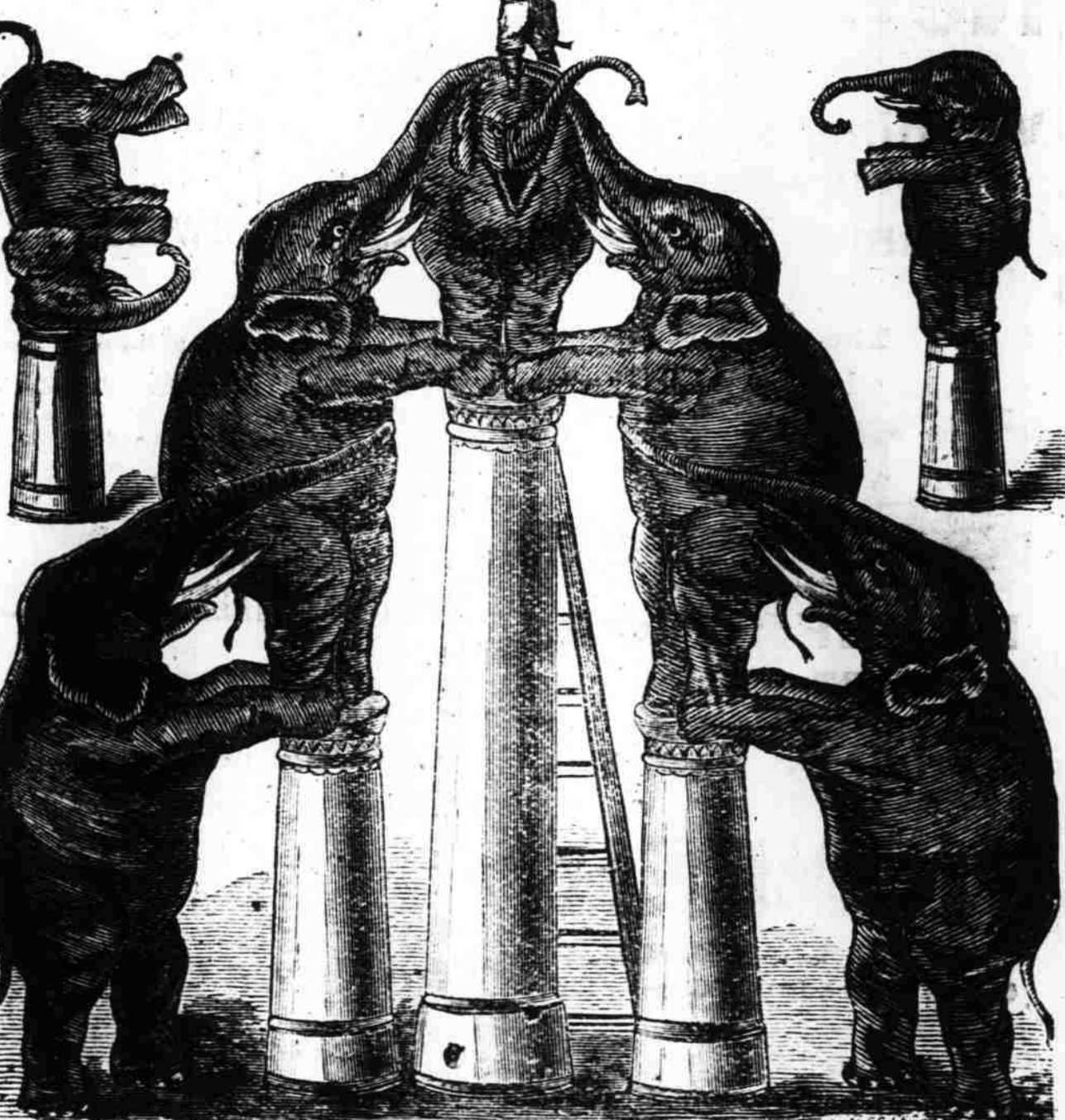
