R. T. Gray, Esq., of Raleigh, will deliver the Memorial address in Wilson.
The laws of 1876-'77 are all printed and ready for binding, except the index.
Corn sold in Newbern on Wednesday at 71 cents, an advance of 11 cents in one day.
Wm. Dunn, Esq., of Newbern, has been appointed Assistant Freight Agent on the A. & N. C. R. R.
The Governor has commissioned Elizer Jackson a commissioner of affidavits for North Carolina resident in New York City.
Mr. C. A. Sherwood and Miss May E. Holden, youngest daughter of ex-Governor Holden were married in Raleigh on Wednesday.
Mr. Geo. W. Rose is to deliver the Memorial address in Fayetteville on the 10th and Mr. Ralph D. Luttrell has been chosen Chief Marshal.

Charlotte is to celebrate the 20th day of May, with all due honors. The military, and the firemen, and the citizens will all join in. Col. H. C. Jones has been appointed Chief Marshal.

The death sentence of Henderson West, of Bertie, who was to have been hung this month, has been commuted by the Governor to a term of 15 years' imprisonment in the Penitentiary.

The Hillsboro Recorder says that Gov. Hampton has written to a lady of that town stating his expectation to be present at the next commencement of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

The Raleigh Observer says: The Public Treasurer continued to pay the interest on the Western North Carolina Railroad mortgage bonds yesterday. The amount paid out so far is \$26,180.00, leaving only \$2,670 of the fourth indebtedness due.

The Wilson Express says: This section was visited by frost on yesterday morning and we learn that vegetables were considerably damaged. It is thought that a great many of our farmers will have to plant a large portion of their cotton over again, as the frost killed all that was up.

The Goldsboro Messenger says: The Schultz-Edwards breach of promise case will hang fire. Wednesday evening Judge Moore set aside the compromise upon affidavit filed by the plaintiff, and the case was re-opened. Mr. Edwards was required to enter into bond to amount of \$8,000.

The South Carolina Press Association, which will be in session next week, has extended an invitation to the N. C. Press Association to "join in with them" at Charleston on the 10th of next month. The meeting of the latter has been changed from the 8th to the 15th and now it is proposed to move it back again so that all may go to Charleston.

The Newbern Nut Shell says: Jos. L. Rhem devoted some 24 acres of ground to the cultivation of garden peas. He has already shipped twenty-two barrels and expects to ship some seventy-five or 100 barrels more this week. He has 100 hands employed picking, and if the season holds good will realize 300 barrels from his crop.

The Wilson Express says: The wheat crop in Wilson, Johnston and Nash counties, is represented to be the most promising, as well as the largest, that has cheered the hearts of the farmer for some years. The plants has a good root and stands well on the ground. The fields on the roads are becoming quite green and with fair seasons a larger quantity of wheat will be made than ever before.

The Raleigh Observer says: We learn from passengers on the North Carolina railroad that there was considerable frost at Hillsborough yesterday morning and ice was found around the tank at the depot. The opinions in regard to the effect on the fruit-crop were varied, some claiming that the damage was not serious, while others were fearful that all was lost. Early vegetables were killed and the damage to gardens is almost irreparable.

Superior Court, Judge Moore presiding, is in session this week at Goldsboro and the Messenger has this to say of its results: Already 10 negroes have been sentenced to the penitentiary for terms ranging from 2 to 10 years each. These are: Joe Cox & Henry Williams, 2 years; Larry Parks 3 years; Handy Al-

kinson 2 years; Eli Oliver 5 years; John Moses 5 years; Jackson Battle 7 years; Walter Maxwell 10 years; Joe Cox 10 years; George Holland 10 years; Dock Best 1 year; and Peter Darden 5 years. All of these are for larceny except the last who plead guilty of perjury.

The Raleigh News says: Col. L. L. Polk, commissioner of agriculture, returned yesterday from a visit to the scene of the fish hatching on the Neuse. The force of young men who had been taken to learn the business was discharged, with the exception of seven, and one of the hatching stations was abolished, reducing the number to three. The drawing of the seine will henceforth be conducted at night instead of daylight, as the ripe spawners run at night, very few being caught in daylight. It is now in contemplation not to establish hatcheries in any other river of the State than the Neuse, but to supply all the other rivers from this, it being considered that the other streams can be stocked just as effectively by this means, and at far less expense, since the transferring of all the hatching material and force from stream to stream will necessarily be attended by considerable outlay, and the department is compelled, on account of the limited means at its command, to make its expenditures as light as possible.

Three Hundred and Fifty Person Confirmed.

(Baltimore Gazette, 30th.)

Yesterday morning at 8 o'clock, at St. Ignatius Catholic Church, Rt. Rev. James Gibbons, Bishop of Richmond, Va., administered the sacrament of confirmation to three hundred and fifty persons. Of this number one hundred and seventy-two were girls, sixty boys, and the balance adults. The bishop stated that he had never at once confirmed so many. He was assisted by Fathers Nagle and Sheerin. At the High Mass at half-past 10 the services were very full and impressive. Rev. Father Necheimer was celebrant, and the bishop preached a very fine sermon on "Christianity as taught by the Apostles." The music of the mass was of solid ecclesiastical style, being Hummel's grand chorale mass No. 1 and Hummel's "Alma Virgo." Miss Genevieve Myers sang the soprano solo of the latter, and the chorus, as also the heavy choruses of the mass, were rendered with great effect by a very full choir, Mrs. Curley directing and Mr. F. Eversman at the organ. Among those taking part were Misses McNeal, Staylor, Pistel, and Mrs. Beidener and Messrs. Ed. Gegan, Hale, Wernig, Huth, L. Gegan, Conolly and Frank. In the afternoon the children assembled in the basement of the church, renewed their baptismal vows and received each a beautiful certificate of confirmation.
