W. T. Hannaford has been elected Mayor of Magnolia. Wake jail holds 27 prisoners, only 25 of whom are colored.

Mr. J. J. Wolfenden, is to be the new Mayor of Newbern. Dr. Frank Smith, of Chatham county, is dead, aged 61 years.

Orange has just sent in seven convicts for work on the railroad. All of the streams around Raleigh are swollen by the recent rains.

Maj. B. C. Manly has been unanimously re-elected Mayor of Raleigh. The new Board of Directors of the Insane Asylum were to have met in Raleigh yesterday.

The Democrats were successful almost everywhere in the municipal elections held last Monday. Mr. Albert Kramer, of Raleigh, has gone to Germany where he will spend three years in study.

The entertainment of the Raleigh Dramatic Association is postponed till Wednesday, the 16th inst. The ladies of the Episcopal church in Wadesboro will give what they call a "Coffee clack" on the 15th.

Since the consolidation of the Third and Fourth Revenue Districts Feb. 1st 1876, the receipts have reached \$1,007,000. The Wadesboro Herald is typographically one of the neatest papers in the State, and continues to improve with each issue.

Pickard, one of the employes, was near the building at the time, and seeing the volumes of smoke arising, burst through the door, and with assistance succeeded in extinguishing the flames without material loss.

The Raleigh News says: We are in receipt of a letter from W. R. Capelhart, Esq., proprietor of Capelhart's noted fisheries on the Roanoke, in the course of which he furnished the following interesting item: "Our private enterprise on the Roanoke bids fair to succeed. On the 21 inst., Mr. Marks, the superintendent, reported one million shad released, and our boxes fairly supplied. We are hatching herring, the first ever hatched. The season has not been favorable, freshets operating detrimental to the interest."

The Charlotte Observer says: Much has been said in the newspapers recently about fine shooting, and some marvelous tales have been told. While we were yet regretting that we had no shooting tale to tell Mr. Zenas Porter, of this county, entered and told the following: Not long since he stood 126 yards from a tree on which sat a hawk, and with a pistol, the barrel of which was only five inches long, put a ball through the body of the bird.
