Gracefully Woodbined.

W. H. Harrison, said to be an Englishman by birth, who has resided in Wilmington for the past six or seven years, left here early last week ostensibly for Baltimore, but in reality for Paris unknown, taking with him every thing portable belonging to himself and some other things, also portable, belonging to other people. Harrison has been known here at various times as a gambler, a bar-keeper and a lottery runner. Some years ago he obtained possession of the charter of the North Carolina Beneficial Association and had a "wheel of fortune" by which he at different times realized considerable amounts here and elsewhere. His last prosperous venture was the establishment here of a lottery business.

At the Kentucky drawing, and to this end he was seeking to organize a company. But the times were hard and money came in too slowly and hence Harrison, despairing of accomplishing anything here, took flight for other scenes. He was accompanied by his family and a man by the name of Mathews, who seems to have been associated with him in the lottery scheme. He stated that he was going to Baltimore, where he had the promise of large subscriptions to his scheme, and would return in a few days, but it was soon ascertained that this was merely a blind to cover his flight. There were many rumors on the street Saturday and to-day relative to the amount of his indebtedness here but some of them are very much exaggerated. Several, it is said, had paid him money for stock, and one party gave him a note for \$600, which he got discounted. He also procured the loan of a lot of jewelry for exhibition, and this has disappeared. There are several debts against him here, and some charges of a more serious nature. The night before he left he obtained from a shoe dealer \$39 worth of shoes which he was to take up to his house to try on and return the next morning and from a clothier he had three suits of clothes sent up to "try on," all of which must have accompanied him in his flight as they have not yet been returned. There is a report afloat to the effect that one mercantile house alone had been victimized to the extent of \$2,500, but on enquiry we find that this is not true, the entire amount being \$400 instead of \$2,500 and the debt being secured by sufficient collaterals. As far as we can ascertain the only things left behind were the charter of his company and the fixtures of an office on South Front street, No. 3, Granite Row, which had been fitted up as headquarters for the lottery concern.

Annual Celebration.

A dispensation for the purpose having been granted by the Vice great Inchoance of the State of North Carolina, Wyoming Tribe, No. 4, I. O. R. M., will on Thursday next May 17th, 1877, have their grand annual parade, on horse back, leaving their Wigwam on Princess, between Front and Second streets, at 3 P. M., sharp, down Princess to Third, down Third to Market down Market to Front down Front to Castle, out Castle to Fifth, up Fifth to Dock, out Dock to Seventh, up Seventh to Market, down Market to Fourth, up Fourth to Nixon, out Nixon to Seventh, down Seventh to Bladen, down Bladen to 4th, down Fourth to Red Cross; down Red Cross to Front, down Front to Princess, up Princess to Wigwam, where the council fire will be quenched. In the evening at 8 1/2 o'clock the orator of the day, P. S. W. H. Gerken, will deliver the oration at the Opera House, to which the public are invited. Immediately after the oration the celebration will conclude with a grand ball, tickets for which can be procured at the book stores, and at Kasprovicz' cigar store, as well as of the committee and other members. Appletons' for June.

Appletons' Journal for June contains several noteworthy papers. The freshest perhaps, is an article entitled "The War with the Turkomans," which is a racy and highly-enjoyable humorous picture of Oriental manners and Persian warfare. Eastern affairs secure further attention in an article called "The Suicide of the Ottomans," in which the causes that have led to the decline of this Ottoman power are investigated and graphically described. In the way of fiction there are the continuation of "Cherry Ripe;" a dramatic short story by M. E. W. S., called "Honor's Slave," in which figure a Russian princess, and English and American characters; and a Philadelphia sketch by Rebecca Harding Davis, called "Doctor Pajot," which is very charming. The article is a picturesque paper on "The Harbor and commerce of New York." Mr. Towle gives a good paper, which he calls the "Reign of Poetry, Art, and Eloquence, in Florence." Junius Henri Brown tell in an effective manner the remarkable story of one of the French poisoners of the time of Louis XIV. Mr. Matthews makes the centenary of the comedy, "The School for Scandal," the occasion for an entertaining paper on that famous play. Among the poems we find "Forty to Twenty: a Drawing-room Drama," by Kate Field, which is, we believe, that lady's first appearance in verse. Under the head of "Collectanea," a cluster of good, short papers on various topics is given; and the editorial departments maintain their usual standard.

Funeral of Mr. Darby.

Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather quite a large concourse of citizens were present at St. Thomas' Church this morning to witness the last sad rites of the Church over the remains of the late Mr. James Darby.

The Hibernian Association, of which Mr. Darby was a prominent member, escorted the remains from his late residence to the Church, and thence to Oakdale Cemetery.
