Weldon News: The farmers tell us in some portions of the county cotton is looking well, while in others it is small and grassy. Rain is beginning to be needed though as yet there is no suffering for the want of it.

Observer: A one dollar subscription has been started by the Lovejoy boys to erect a monument to his memory. If all the boys that attended his school will pay in this small mite, \$2,500 will be raised at once.

Raleigh News: Mr. J. S. Overman, clerk in the executive office, has received an invitation to deliver the address at the Grand Convention of the Chi Phi Fraternity, to be held at White Sulphur Springs, Va., August 8th.

Greensboro Patriot: Monday night at High Point, thieves entered the sleeping apartment of M. Jarell, abstracted from his pockets keys of his safe, and entering the store rifled the safe of some \$200 in money, jewelry and a watch, which latter was left in the yard with the pants.

Raleigh Observer: The funeral of Mr. J. M. Lovejoy from Christ Episcopal Church yesterday evening was largely attended, and all classes of our citizens were represented in the line of march to the cemetery. His boys, as he always called them, the pupils of his school, formed a line of procession to themselves, and, at the conclusion of the burial service performed the honors of covering up the remains. It was quite an imposing as well as a sad scene.

Charlotte Observer: A report received here yesterday evening to the effect that in the recent contested election case in Monroe on local option, Judge Buxton had decided in favor of the prohibitionists. The report lacks confirmation, but was received from a source sufficiently reliable to warrant its publication. This case was one of unusual interest on account of the fact that in a very warm contest the prohibitionists won the day by only one vote. The "license" party charged that one of the votes cast for prohibition was illegal, because it was given by a man who was not entitled to vote on account of abridgment of some sort. The case was taken before Judge Buxton at chambers in Fayetteville, and the above is announced as his decision.

Charlotte Observer: A negro man named Frank Johnston, who is in the employ of Mr. L. W. Sanders, attempted suicide last evening between sunset and dark, on the premises of Mr. H. Frankenthal, on Church street, near Trade, where his wife resides. The medium employed for the accomplishment of his purpose was laudanum, of which he drank about two ounces, when a friend detected him and snatched the bottle from his lips. No attention was paid to him until he became stupefied by the drug, when physicians were sent for. Drs. McAden, Gibbon, and Miller gave the case their attention, and after administering emetics freely and making use of all the other means usually resorted to in such cases, left the man at 10 o'clock, pronouncing him out of danger. Domestic trouble was the cause of the attempt at self-destruction.

[Charlotte Observer.] Hon. Jeremiah S. Black on the Conflict of Jurisdiction.

We make the following extract from a letter of Hon. J. S. Black, of Penn., to Judge Schenck of this State, in regard to the question of State jurisdiction over Federal officers who violate the laws of North Carolina. It will be seen that the eminent lawyer fully sustains Judge Schenck's view:

York, Pa., June 18, 1877.

I understand the conflict in your State to arise on a murder committed by a Federal officer upon a citizen. Upon what pretence can jurisdiction be claimed by the courts of the United States? It is not among the cases enumerated by the Constitution to which the Federal power shall extend. I do not say that a question may not be raised on the trial which might authorize a review on writ of error by the Supreme Court. But—murder by whomsoever done or suffered is an offence against the State alone, and the accused is triable only in the State courts. There can be no removal of such a case for trial. I speak with reference to the Constitution without examining other authorities. Decisions which agree with the constitution are useless—those which oppose it are false. I am, yours truly,

Funeral of the Late J. M. Lovejoy, Esq.

Yesterday afternoon, at 6 o'clock, the funeral services of the late Jefferson Madison Lovejoy took place at Christ (Episcopal) Church, Rev. Dr. Marshall officiating. After the services in the church the remains were interred in the family lot in the old City Cemetery.

The announcement of Mr. Lovejoy's death will send a thrill of sadness to many in this State. From one end of

its borders to the other are those who have profited by his instructions. He was born in Vermont in 1813, and graduated with the first honor at Middlebury College, that State, when about 21 years of age. He came immediately to this State, and opened a school in Pittsboro, Clatham county. The year following he came to this city and opened a school, teaching uninterruptedly until 1867, when he removed to Scotland Neck, Halifax county, where he remained but a few years and then came back to this place, recommenced his school, and taught up to the commencement of the present vacation. As an educator of youth he never had a superior in this State, and some of the best and most distinguished men within his confines are now proud to say that they were his pupils.

Mr. Lovejoy, though a man of marked eccentricities, was noted for his sterling worth and unyielding integrity. As a man of deep learning and genius he had no superior in the South, and his death is looked upon in this community as a public calamity.
