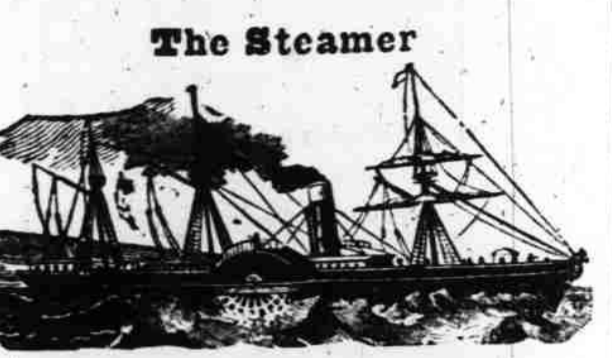

Notice—Schedule B Tax. ALL WHOLESALERS AND RETAIL Merchants are hereby notified that a privilege tax was levied by the last Legislature of Five Dollars, (the same levied by county) in addition to the Schedule taxes proper. Wholesale dealers are also notified that in giving in their purchases the law now compels payment on all purchases, made within the State as well as out of the State, (including timber, lumber, turpentine, spirits turpentine, rosin and naval stores of any kind and cotton.) All hotels, boarding houses, restaurants and eating houses are required by law to pay a tax of one-half per cent. on gross receipts. The tax will be due July 1st and payable within the first ten days thereafter, on all purchases since the 1st of January 1877.
