The steamer *North State* did not make her regular trip to Fayetteville yesterday, but remained over to undergo inspection of her boilers, &c., by Messrs. Kirkwood and Hawes, the U. S. Inspectors of passenger boats who are here on their annual inspecting tour.

Apple Jelly.

One peck of sharp green apples; pare and core them; put them into a well-tinned saucepan; pour on them one quart of spring water; put them over a slow fire till all a mash; pour through a new flannel bag; when cold, to every pint of juice add a quarter of a pound of loaf sugar; boil fast and skim it well until it jellies; pour it into moulds for dessert; double the quantity of sugar, if wanted to keep all the year.

The Excursion to Wilmington.

Yesterday's *Charlotte Observer* says: "The excursion which the Charlotte Grays propose to take next week to Wilmington, Smithville and Wrightsboro, is attracting a good deal of attention. Less than twenty tickets were offered to outsiders, and nearly all are taken. The excursion is bound to be a delightful affair. It leaves here next Monday evening at 6:30 o'clock. Tickets good for ten days, to bring bearer back by any regular train, are offered at \$4."

Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met yesterday afternoon pursuant to adjournment, present His Honor, the Mayor, and Aldermen Bowden, VonGlahn, Vollers, Flanner, Foster, Hill, Lowery and King.
Proceedings of last meeting were read and approved.
After considerable discussion in regard to the contract for the keeping of the mules, carts, &c., on motion of Alderman VonGlahn, the bids were referred to the Committee on Contracts for further consideration and for a fuller report.
The petition of Morgan & Bryan for the erection of a sign was not granted.
Petition of the barbers for the re-enactment of the ordinance closing barber shops on Sundays, was laid on the table.
Petition for side-walk on Seventh street, was referred to the Committee on Streets and Wharves.
The tax ordinance was then taken up and partially finished, pending the consideration of which, on motion of Alderman Flanner, the Board adjourned till this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

How to Curl your Hair.

Pretty Household Fashions.

One of the charming and noticeable things about Paris, says Jennie June is the profusion of plants, pots, and flowers. The masses of white, blue, purple and yellow blossoms make a picture wherever the eye rests, and ladies who "receive"—and everybody does receive that is anybody, from October until May or June—are enabled to avail themselves of this profusion for the adornment of their rooms at a very slight cost. The mode is to contract to have your rooms supplied with a given number of plants for the season, and these are brought and renewed, the old ones being taken away every week. With the plants are usually brought a couple of bouquets of freshly cut flowers, which look brilliant for the day, while the plants, of course, keep always their graveness, as they are renewed before they have time to lose their beauty. The cost of this luxury is only from \$25 to \$50 or \$40 per season according to quantity required.

The Evening Star.

The planet of Jupiter, now the most brilliant star in the heavens, will soon find a competitor for the ascendancy. A formidable rival has already entered the arena. It is the planet of Venus, which may be seen on any clear night, low down in the west, when the sun is sunk far enough below the horizon to allow the lesser luminary to become visible. Venus was in superior conjunction with the sun on the 16th of May, and has been evening star ever since, but too near the sun to be seen until within a short time. One of the interesting planetary events of July may be found in watching the movements of this bright evening star. It sets now about twenty minutes before nine, an hour after the sun. As it is receding from the sun, and coming towards the earth, it will each evening be visible for a longer time after sunset, and apparently increase in brilliancy. On the evening of the 11th instant it was in conjunction with the new moon of the 10th, and the soft golden star for a companion, made a celestial picture.

They Agree Upon a Verdict.
The Hastings Court yesterday the case of *Beattie* came on for trial. The jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff. John S. Wise appeared as defendant and S. B. Witt for plaintiff.
The presence of Mr. Wise was demanded by the Police Court, where he was engaged in a suit for Mrs. King. Being impatient to try the suit, and the regular jury present at a jury, and submit the case to them. Judge Guigon at first refused the proposition, but afterwards assented, as it really seemed important for Mr. Wise to leave for the Police Court, and Judge Guigon desired to close his business for the term in his own court.

The case was being tried by Judge Guigon when the case was taken out of counsel's hands. After consultation the jury rendered a verdict for Dr. Beattie.

Notice—Schedule B Tax.

ALL WHOLESALE AND RETAIL Merchants are hereby notified that a privilege tax was levied by the last Legislature of Five Dollars, (the same levied by county) in addition to the Schedule tax proper. Wholesale dealers are also notified that in giving in their purchases the law now compels payment on all purchases, made within the State as well as out of the State, (including timber, lumber, turpentine, spirits turpentine, resin and naval stores of any kind and cotton.) All hotels, boarding houses, restaurants and eating houses are required by law to pay a tax of one-half per cent. on gross receipts. The tax will be due July 1st and payable within the first ten days thereafter, on all purchases since the 1st of January 1877.
All parties interested in the payment of Schedule B Taxes will save costs by attending to the same at once as the law will be strictly enforced. J. E. SAMPRON,
